



SPAIN WILL NOT SUBMIT SUB WARFARE

Though Desiring Peace, Government Considers Intervention Premature

Madrid, March 5, via Paris. -Premier Romanones, in addessing Saturday a meeting of the cabinet, presided over by King Alfonso, reviewed the policy of the government during last two sessions of parliament, and then referred to President Wilson's peace note. Declaring the Spanish government found itself in a delicate situation in the face of contradictory sentiments, the premie said he shared President Wilson's desire for peace, but judged that intervention would be

premature. Premier Romanoes also commented on the Spanish reply to Germany's declaration of a submarine blockade. The economic life of Spain, he said, could not and would not be interrupted. and the government would make the greatest efforts to relieve the crisis resulting from war and the submarine
