

Wilson Places U. S. Navy on War Footing

Two Military Departments Established on Atlantic Seaboard; Extensive Precautions Being Taken Against Outbreaks by Teutons

Washington March 25—The Eastern Seaboard has been divided into three military departments as a war measure. Gen Wood has been transferred from the entire present department to one of the new divisions with headquarters at Charleston. Major-Gen. J. Franklin Bell is to command the new Eastern department, with headquarters at Governor's Island.

Washington, March 25—President Wilson took steps to-day to place the nation on a war footing. By executive order he directed that the navy be recruited without delay to full authorized war strength of 87,000 enlisted men. Taken in connection with emergency naval construction already ordered, this means that the President has exercised the full limit of his legal powers as Commander-in-Chief to prepare the navy for war.

For the army, the President directed that two new military departments be created in the Atlantic coast region. The order means that the task of organizing whatever army Congress may authorize will be divided among six departmental commanders instead of four in the interests of speed and efficiency in mobilization.

Protect U. S. Industries
The third step was to assume as a national duty the task of protecting American industries from domestic disorders in the event of hostilities. For this purpose eleven full infantry regiments, two separate battalions and one separate company of National Guards were called back into the Federal Service to act as national police in important districts. Supplementing these troops, a regiment of Pennsylvania guards and two companies of Georgia infantry, en route home from the border for muster out, were ordered retained in the Federal service.

The President's orders were made known in terse official statements issued by both departments. No explanation accompanied them except the statement that reorganization of the military departments, effective May 1, was designed to fac-

ilitate decentralization of command. More National Than Local
The official statement from the War Department states that many States have already deemed it advisable to call on the Guard for protection and as the necessity for such a step arises from issues "more national than local," the President has deemed it advisable to call into Federal service more than a dozen regiments.

The states included are: New York, Massachusetts, Vermont, Connecticut, New Jersey, Delaware, Pennsylvania, Maryland, the District of Columbia and Virginia. One Georgia regiment and two companies of a Pennsylvania regiment which are still in the Federal service, will not be mustered out under the provisions of the order.

Guard Niagara Plants
Albany, N. Y., March 25—The request of the Buffalo Chamber of Commerce that the power plants at Niagara Falls be guarded by National Guardsmen, was granted to-night by Governor Whitman. The executive announced that he had directed Adjutant-General L. W. Stotesbury, now in New York, to order out enough troops to properly do the work. They will be selected from Buffalo units.

The request for troops was made to Governor Whitman yesterday by a delegation from the Buffalo Chamber of Commerce, which came here for that purpose. The action was taken after rumors of plots against industrial plants were circulated.
