The New England states has suffered more severely from the late frosts than any other part of the Continent. The damage to the wheat crop in Manitoba is very slight.

The Eastern Extension special train that ran down on Tuesday night to take up the bodies of the dead brakemen, killed three horses near French River.

Several ships are reported as unable to leave Quebec for want of sailors to navigate them, there never having been a greater scarcity of seamen there than at present wages ranging from 15 dollars to 40 dollars per month, the former for long and the latter for European voyages.

Thomas Oliver Arnold J. P. aged 76 an old and respected resident of Sussex N. B. who has been ill for some time, was found drowned in a little brook behind his house. It is supposed (by the afflicted gentleman, in a fit of temporary derangement, arose and dressed himself, and went to the brook where his remains were found.

It is reported that Messrs. Symmes, Dawson & Co. have received the contract for construction of the Chignecto Marine Railway, during the last session of the Dominion Parliament, at the instance of Charles Tooper, Bart., a vote of 6,000,000 dollars was given to complete the work.

NEW MARKET, Ont., September 2.

For some time past the Salvation Army has caused a good deal of trouble to the merchants, especially on Saturday night, by the crowd which they attracted, blocking up the doors of several stores and rendering the sidewalks impassable. The authorities forbade the army to linger on the streets, yet, notwithstanding this warning, the officers resolved to continue, and last night a very large crowd assembled to see the fun which was anticipated. The captain, a stout lady, was holding forth vigorously to the crowd when a constable drove up and tried to get them to move on. The captain resented this and remarked that he had often been struck by Roman Catholics, but that this was the first time she had been interfered with by a Protestant, apparently appealing to the crowd for sympathy. A scene of great confusion then ensued. The lady held her ground, however, shouting her best from a chair on the street, while the crowd yelled and hooted, and several fire crackers were thrown at her. More constables having arrived, one seized the captain, another a happy T-m, a lieutenant, and the rest of the fire took care of a dozen privates, and the whole army was marched off to the lock up, to the hooting and yelling of the singing crowd, the members of the Army marching exultantly to prison shouting "Glory," "Hail, Hail," etc. They were all locked up, but in about half an hour some friends bailed them out, and, nothing daunted, the same obstruction was again repeated. Finally they marched to their barracks, making various appeals to the crowd.
