Those who are endeavoring to buy up in large quantities claim that within a few weeks the stamps will have a great deal of value, and some people assert that not more than twenty per cent of the stamps ever issued to carry Her Majesty's mail.

Winchester Press. So well pleased were the council and a large number of our citizens with the work done by the Champion Road Machine last week that it has been purchased by the council for the corporation. With this machine and the portable steam engine, the council will be able to do any road work there is no town of similar size in the whole of America better equipped than Winchester, and as well for repairing and maintaining the streets in a proper way. The two machines will cost \$1,400, but the council will be repaid in a few years, and the investment must be regarded as a good one.

Death of an Evangelist. Miss Cordelia Winchell, evangelist, died at the residence of her sister, Mrs. Jas. Findlay, of Beachburg, on Thursday night last. This announcement was a deep sorrow, as she was widely known as a devoted christian worker. She has of late years been working in her beloved calling in Manitoba, and although consumption had grasped her in its deadly embrace she did not think of herself but of others. Only a few days previous to her death she arrived in Cobden from Manitoba, the hand of death upon her. Of her it may be truthfully said "a sweet odor doing good." Beetles Are Sores. Up to the present time the indications are that the potato beetle will not be at all troublesome this year. At the present time the potato beetle is not so numerous as in previous years, and the reports from the district would lead one to believe that there is a similar scarcity elsewhere. The absence of bugs this year is likely due to the severe frosts of last winter, which a light snow fall, which may have killed the beetles hibernating in the soil. The scarcity may be also in part due to the systematic spraying with paris green which most farmers now give their potato-tops.

It would be interesting to readers if farmers in the Ottawa district would send notes of their observations in regard to the potato beetle this year to Dr. Fletcher, the entomologist at the Experimental Farm. Should this absence of the bug prove general it would mean a large gain to the farmers, who lose a great deal every year through the ravages of this destructive pest.
