RED FLAG FOOLISHNESS

We haven't noticed any Russian rebellion flag by day, nor any summer carnival illumination by night, in connection with the passage through our village of traction engines, and it is evident that the law of the road is being fractured in several more or less vital spots by owners of traction engines in this county. Attention is directed to the following sections of Chap. 242 R.S.O.:

Sec. 7—Every engine run after dark shall carry a bright red light in a conspicuous place in front and a green light in the rear of the train.

Sec. 8—No engine shall be run through a city, town or village unless a messenger is sent at least fifteen and not more than thirty rods in advance carrying a red flag by day and a bright red light by night. The fine for neglect of these conditions may be \$25.

The addition of a section calling for skyrockets, Roman candles and transparencies by night and red lemonade, peanuts and other light refreshments by day would give a more truly festive air to this piece of legislative claptrap.

Mr. Donovan's New Duties
