BOASTFUL WIDOW

Assassin Gibteau's Relict is to Marry a Third.

She is Proud of the Murderer of Garfield Because "He Was no Common Murderer."

Chicago, Nov. 17.—Yesterday a marriage license was issued to Mrs. Anna Dumire and Emory Allen. Mrs. Dumire was formerly the wife of Charles J. Gibteau, assassin of Garfield, and evidently is proud of the fact, as in conversation with the license clerk, she said:

"I've been a famous woman in my time. My first husband was Charles J. Gibteau, who was hanged. After that I married Mr. Dumire. Once I was more famous than you ever will be. I have a son on the ship 'Lancaster'."

Mrs. Dumire then leaned over the clerk's counter and grew confidential. "Charles was no common murderer. He was a political offender. Many a famous man visited him in jail and just before he was taken out to be killed I was the last to bid him good-bye. Oh, I have always been good to my husband."

FROM OVER THE OCEAN

Very Latest Cable News.

HIS PATRIOTIC SPEECH.

LORD ROSEBERY TELLS WHAT GREAT BRITAIN MUST DO IN THE STRUGGLE FOR EXISTENCE—CHINESE AND SOUTH AFRICAN AFFAIRS.

Glasgow, Nov. 17.—The Earl of Rosebery was installed to-day as Lord Rector of the Glasgow University. His rectorial address, on the subject of "The British Empire," was a stirring appeal to the race to realize its responsibilities and to prepare to fight for its existence. Never, said the former premier, had the Empire so urgently required the strenuous support of its subjects, because there was a disposition abroad to challenge both its naval and commercial supremacy. The twentieth century, he declared, would be a period of keen, intelligent, and almost fierce international competition, more probably in the arts of peace even than in the arts of war. Therefore, he added, it was necessary to undertake periodical stock-taking, to remodel the state machinery and educational methods, and to become more business-like and thorough as warriors, merchants and statesmen, and to look thoroughly to the training of first-rate men for the struggle ahead, as on these depended the future of the Empire and the race. He thought that the now antiquated methods of training had almost ruined the educational apparatus.

BOERS AT MISCHIEF.

They Continue Cutting the Railway in Many Places.

London, Nov. 17.—The Boers, according to the Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Mail, have broken the railway in twenty places between Bloemfontein and the Orange River, and the line was cut yesterday between Kimberley and Beaufort.

"The Vryheid garribe is practically besieged," says the Pietermaritzburg correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, wiring Thursday, "and the town is evacuated. A position has been taken on the hills commanding it and notices have been posted in the vicinity, warning the Boers that if they attempt to recapture the town it will be blown to pieces."

SHE IS INSANE.

The Woman Who Buried a Hatchet at Emperor William at Breslau.

Breslau, Nov. 16.—The woman who hurled a hatchet at Emperor William as he was driving in an open carriage

here yesterday, is a tradeswoman of Breslau. A provisional medical examination of the prisoner has been made, and she has been pronounced to be insane. While Emperor William was returning from the barracks to the railroad station he was cheered by immense crowds of people, who were gathered along the route.

A SECRET TREATY.

One Said to Have Been Entered Into Between Russia and China.

London, Nov. 17.—Unconfirmed statements emanate from Paris and Odessa that secret treaty has been concluded between Russia and China for Russian occupation of Manchuria.

There is no fresh news this morning, throwing light on the actual situation. The Japanese minister in London, who was interviewed yesterday, hinted at the possibility of the allies pursuing the Chinese court into the interior if they desired, although he said it would be a long process. Shanghai sends a report that the Empress Dowager, alarmed at the rising in Kan Su, now contemplates returning to Tai Yuan Fu. From Harrow comes a report that Gen. Tung Fu Hsiang is still at Shan Fu, protecting the Empress Dowager; that Prince Tuan had fled to Kan Su, and that the whereabouts of Ya Hsien, governor of Shan Si, is unknown. It is said that Prince Ching will be sent to Germany to apologize for the murder of Baron von Ketteler.

GAINED HIS FREEDOM.

Negro Taken From the Jail by Would-be Lynchers, Escapes From Them.

Albemarle, N. C., Nov. 17.—A negro accused of poisoning Dr. Love, who died here under suspicious circumstances several months ago, turned the tables on a mob, which attempted to lynch him during the night. He not only escaped the mob, but obtained his freedom, and has not been captured. On being refused entrance to the jail, the mob battered a hole in the wall. They forced the door of the negro's cell, dragged him out and pushed him through the hole where they had entered. When the negro touched the ground he broke away from those guarding the exit, and amid a shower of bullets disappeared in the darkness.

SHORT OF FUNDS.

A Canadian Doctor Stranded in Chicago Takes His Own Life.

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 17.—Dr. George K. Crosthwaite, a physician, of Hamilton, Ont., blew out his brains shortly after midnight Wednesday in the washroom at the Railroad Men's Christian Association hotel, at 169 Plymouth Place. (The body was found in a chair at 2 o'clock yesterday morning by James McLaughlin, assistant secretary of the association. Dependence, due to being stranded in a strange city, with but 22 cents in his pocket and no friends to whom he could apply for aid, is thought to have been the cause of the suicide.)

Six deer from Muskoka, evidences of the good marksmanship of Leamington hunters, passed through this city last evening in transit for the last named place.

One of the social events of the season took place last evening when Miss Susan Taylor made her debut in Chatham society at the residence of her sister, Mrs. Samuel Gleason, Park street. There were over seventy young people present.

General Agent Tillson, of the Lake Erie, has secured a special from Chatham to the Dresden celebration, on Monday evening. The train will leave Chatham at 7:30, and will leave Dresden at 12:30. The Wallaceburg Conservatives have also arranged for a special. Bands in uniform will be carried at half fare.

The firemen feel somewhat hurt at the report in last evening's Planet that it took them 32 minutes to get to the fire on William street Thursday night. Foreman Fritchard says that he can get out and pull the trucks by hand to the fire in that time. Chief Engineer Moore, of the waterworks department, says that it was just 6 1/2 minutes from the time that the alarm reached the pump-house until the firemen began to use the water.

A COLD NIGHT. Thursday night was the coldest yet this fall. The mercury stood 15 above zero, which is 17 degrees of frost. Last year 27 above zero was the lowest the thermometer stood during the whole of November. On the 6th of December, 1899 was the first really cold snap. The thermometer then went down to 15 above zero.

DRESSED HOGS IN DEMAND. The swine buyers report the market price of hogs at \$6 per cwt. for dressed, and from \$4.50 to \$4.75 for live. The market for dressed hogs is firm. O'Keefe & Drew have quite a large quantity of dressed hogs sold for the whole of November. They say that now is a good time for the farmer to sell as packers are anxious to get the meat to cure so that they can ship it to the lumber woods and mines before navigation closes.

SATURDAY'S MARKET. Despite the disagreeable weather, there was a good Saturday market. The supply of vegetables was complete, but there were no changes in value to note. The shed was filled, poultry constituting the chief offering. Turkeys sold at from a dollar down, geese 40 to 50c, ducks, 25 to 35c, and chickens 20 to 30c. Eggs were scarce at 18c, a dozen, and better were fairly plentiful at 20c, a pound. Dressed pork sold at from 7 to 8c, according to the quarter, and beef at 5 1/2c. Potatoes were in heavy supply at from 30 to 40c, a bag and apples were plentiful at 30c a bag.
