TRAINS LOST IN THE FLOODS

New York Officials Cannot Locate Missing Locomotives.

Not an Arrival Yesterday—Thrilling Experiences of the Passengers:

New York, March 3.—Not a western train entered the Grand Central station this afternoon or evening. All were stalled somewhere along the line or delayed by the floods. Nothing came down the Hudson river division except the local train. At the station it was said that not even a report of any trains due could be had because of the condition of the wires. The eastern express due at 8:45 o'clock this evening had not been heard of at 9 and the officials said they did not know where it was. The day express, due at 7 o'clock was not reported. The Chicago limited, at 6:30, and the southwestern limited due at 6, were in places the officials knew nothing about. There was no knowledge of where the New York & New England express, due at 2:55 in the afternoon, was. The Chicago express was due at 1:30, but no report of it had been received. There was not a word received of the condition or situation of the Empire state express, due at 10 to-night.

Hudson, N. Y., March 3.—High water in the Hudson river, and the forming of ice gorges above the city, south of Albany, have stopped railway traffic on the New York Central & Hudson River road. Four large passenger trains are stalled there in the flood, one being the Empire State express. The waters have risen so high about them that the cars are submerged to the roofs and heavy ice is pounding them hard, threatening demolition. A work train from Hudson, which went to the assistance of the others also is caught in the flood and can't move in either direction, the locomotive fires being extinguished. The passengers on the Empire state express were badly frightened, having to remain in the cars several hours. During the night, the ice battering the cars while the water was up to the seats. They were finally rescued from their perilous position by rowboats and placed in a relief train which was sent here.

comes in by way of Port Stanley for the whole of it.

"But your present lease has years yet to run; then why did you decide to go to Rondeau with your coal business?"

"Our lease will be up in twelve years. We cannot be expected to rent so expensive a plant for twelve years."

It was now March, Mr. Walker said. The lease was made in August. Finally when it was drawn up, some new clauses were found to have been inserted. Rather than delay, he had agreed to allow these clauses to remain. Even with this, the matter had been delayed from time to time in a most unsatisfactory manner.

"By the way," the Lake Erie President went on, "your city auditor, Mr. Jewell, has been up at our office going over last season's operations. That was two or three weeks ago. He was unable to obtain all the information your Mayor wanted. He came back Friday last, and brought a young man with him, who finally, we discovered, was an auditor in the Grand Trunk offices in Montreal. I called Mr. Jewell into my office this morning, and explained to him that no Grand Trunk man could be allowed to examine our accounts. Why this thing should have been done, I do not know. It was not fair to us. Let the city employ any auditor for the purpose of a competing line."

Mr. Walker did not believe any auditor accustomed to ordinary work could examine the accounts of a railroad company.

RECOLLECTIONS OF LOUIS RIEL

Capt. Boles Gives The Planet Most Interesting an Interview Thereon.

Had Charge of the Famous Prisoner While he was Awaiting Death.

The Riel rebellion of 1885, of which such a short account is given in the Canadian History, was a very interesting one and one which is well remembered by many of Chatham's citizens. Probably there is one man in the city who has more cause than any other to remember this uprising owing to the fact that he was one of the men who fought against the rebels. That man is Captain Gordon Boles, well known in the city, and a member of the Northwest Mounted Police at the time of the rebellion.

Captain Boles left Chatham for the Northwest in July, '84, and for two years served in the Northwest Mounted Police and served as a scout for the police during the whole of the Riel rebellion.

At the close of the rebellion he returned to Chatham, but went back again and acted as constable in charge of Riel during the whole of the trial, which lasted for about a week. In conversation with The Planet, Captain Boles said:

"The rebellion, as you know, was an uprising among the half-breeds in the Northwest. They had been engaged in putting down a railroad for the Canadian Government through the country, and because the Government were a little slow in recompensing them for their work they took up arms to force their rights. Riel, who, while a half-breed, was better educated than the most of them, was chosen as the man to lead them, but the war was mostly guerilla fighting as the half-breeds knew nothing about how to conduct a campaign. It resembled greatly the present war in South Africa."

"The first battle of the rebellion was fought on 26th March, 1885, and this practically opened the war. At this battle the fight was against the mounted police and the rebels. We came out of this fight with 16 wounded and 13 killed. We could not tell how much the other side suffered. The next battle, at Fish Creek, was fought between General Middleton and Riel, the regulars from the South having arrived at this time. After this battle the police were engaged chiefly in scout work. The other battle was that of Beatoche, where Middleton was successful. This battle practically closed the rebellion."

"Riel gave himself up in June, the rebellion having lasted for three months, and was taken to the Regina jail, where I had charge of him. It was fortunate indeed that the uprising started so early in the year as Riel, having once started the Indians on the war path, could not keep them in control. On account of the cold weather, however, they were not able to move as well as they could in the warmer part of the year. At Frog Lake and Fort Pitt, the murders and slaughters done by the Indians were simply horrible and he gained for these, besides inciting the Indians and half-breeds to rebel, that Riel was hanged."
