LAND OF EVANGELINE.

Land With a History That Is Yet Pros

perous, Materially and Otherwise -Some Comparisons. Happy is the land that has no history is a saying that can scarcely be said to apply to any country for an indefinite length of time. The land of Evangeline has certainly all the appearance at this day, of a share of prosperity, material and otherwise. There is, perhaps, no more fertile tract of country on the continent than the Annapolis Valley. The diked farms, where owners have the opportunity of shutting out or admitting at will in perods of drouth the tides of the never lack for moisture. The oldfashioned manner of building the dikes, which were used by the primitive inhabitants of this productive valley, are still in use by the farmers of the Annapolis country. They have not been able to invent anything superior for repelling the vasion of the sea. The mud and turf walls are still as serviceable for the rpose as they were 250 years ago. In England there was experiment at immense expense to keep out the tides by building a wall of wooden The experiment was unsucspiles. cessful. It was found that the water got under the timbers and raised hem, and the old-fashioned system, as seen round the Basin of Mines, and other points in the Annapolis Valley, was resorted to. A recent party from Ontario, and H. H. S. writes that they visited the Evangeline well, and the row of guarded willows, of which Charles G. D. Roberts writes, "whose branches perchance tell over to the young leaves of each recurring spring what they saw of Evangeline and her sorrow." Near this spot were unearthed not very long ago some blacksmith's tools which some were ready enough to connect with the site of the old blacksmith's shop; and also there were discovered the foundations of a good-sized building which, it is con-

jectured, may have been the site of the Mass house where the Acadians were kept in confinement before they were placed on the ships to be taken out of their country. The tourist through the land of Evangeline is bombarded with clouds Evangeline literature, good, bad and indifferent. Bushels of mawkish rubbish have been written on the great incident in the history of Grand Pre, much of it is very bad verse, and remarkable feature about the local literature is the small amount attention paid by the writers to the romantic and artistic story of Longfellow, while the amateurish efforts of some of the poorer verse-makers are liberally quoted. On the other hand, those who have been fascinated by the chapters which Parkman devotes in simple but strong English to the tale of this unpatriotic and unhappy people, are struck with the similarity between the work of this great historian and some of the literature of the locality. If there has ever been any doubt as to where Parkman obtained his data, perusal of this local literature should at once remove it. By far the most ably written description of the land of Evangeline which the party came across in their travels was the exceedingly bright and clever little work of Mr. Roberts. By a drive of fourteen miles from Kentville or Wolfville, the tourist reaches Lookoff Mountain, where there is obtained a view of rare grandeur over the Minas Basin, the Annapolis and Gaspereau Valley, the bold outlines of Blomidon Promotory, the Villages of Canning, Grand Pre, and other small
