International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow—"The Brazen Serpent."—Num. 21, 1-6.

Golden Text—"As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of Man be lifted up; that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have eternal life."

How quick the transition, from victory over King Anan and the Canaanites to murmuring and rebellion against God and Moses by this discouraged host, to be chastened as children into submission. Our Lord uses this incident to lead Nicodemus into a new spiritual life from dead formalism and sin. As God would have every bitter Israelite look to the brazen serpent and trust His word for pardon and restoration to life and health, so God sending His Son in the likeness of sinful flesh and for our sin to die, will for His name's sake forgive and impart spiritual life and health to every sin-bitten soul that believeth in Him. As there was no other way for a poisoned Israelite to live then, there is no other way for God to save a sinner from his sin now, but through Jesus.
