Several interesting immigrants, rather repatriated Canadians, we recently arrived in this country. These are the group of Prince Albert politicians who some two years ago held the bogus poll north of the Saskatchewan town It will be remembered that in the Saskatchewan elections, parties of officials, some of them Dominion officers, were sent to the unorganized districts to conduct the elections They returned with ballot boxes and poll books in excellent order, and unanimous vote of 140, too, for the Government candidate. It was discovered afterward by the opposition party that polls were never held and that the brazen officials did not go within hundreds of miles of their designated district. They sat down in a camp on the prairie by themselves, manufactured a voters' list, inventing the names, -ut in a ballot for each name, marking all for the Government candidate and writing the names on the poll book. Then they cheerfully swore to everything as regular and received their reward. It was a beautiful arrangement, and gave the Government candidate a majority, though he was behind in the remainder of his constituency.

When the plot was discovered the local representative of the Department of Justice took no action. He sems to have been satisfied. But private parties prosecuted and then the local representative of the Dominion Minister of Justice appeared for the defence. Some of the paron his advice pleaded guilty were mildly fined, the machine supplying the money. Several others departed to the United States These perpetrators of frauds, perjuries and forgeries have now returned to their old resorts, and are doubtless prepared to render further service to their party in the approaching Dominion elections.

SUSPECTED OF ARSON.

Arrest Follows Inquest on Recent Fires at Dovercourt.

Dovercourt, Aug. 31.—Following the fire inquest held by Provincial Inspector Rogers at Dovercourt yesterday into a number of incendiary fires in the neighborhood, Ross Palmeter, aged 25 years, who with his wife lives on Dovercourt road, was arrested last night by Constable Burns and County Constable Tomlinson, charged with arson.

Palmeter was taken on another street in the vicinity while unloading furnisure and locked up in No. 1 police station, pending his removal to the jail.

It will be remembered that at the time of the several fires in Dovercourt the prisoner suffered the loss of a stable or large outbuilding.

The specific charge laid against Palmeter is that on Aug. 8 he set fire to an outhouse on Jameson's property.

The arrest was made on the advice of County Crown Attorney Monahan, after the evidence had been concluded yesterday.

ment manufacturers free iron and steel, giving them advantage of ten per cent. Mr. Clements said that he had always protested against this bounty system. Two m.llion five hundred thousand dollars in bounties had been given away by the Liberal Government last year. If there was to be protection, why couldn't it be straight protection.

Then there was the petroleum question. Prior to 1896 there was a pro-ect on amounting to five and two cents on oal from the States. Then free oil was advocated. Canadian people were paying 25 cents for coal oil when the Americans were getting it for ten cents. It was in 1896 that the Liberal Government first allowed the Standard oil people to get a foothold in the Dominion. The result was that they soon controlled every interest, and the people did not get oil any cheaper now than they did five years ago. Two hundred and eighty thousand dollars in oil bounties were paid out, and there was no tax. If the duty had remained, the farmers would be receiving to day \$2.25 per barrell instead of \$1.65.
