A CROMWELL FOR CZAR

Will Russia Duplicate Protector's Treatment of Charles I.?

Civil War Possible at Any Moment—All Russia in a Turmoil—Counselors of the Czar Are Divided and His Majesty Hesitates to Dissolve Parliament—Troops Powerless to Cope With Peasants.

St. Petersburg, July 20.—(C. A. P.)—An address to the country, setting forth the attitude of the Parliament on the agrarian question and the reasons for the delay in the adoption of a resolution of the problem was adopted by the lower House at 2 o'clock this morning, but in an unexcited form, with changes designed to minimize the revolutionary features of the document as an appeal to the people against the Government and to shift the emphasis to a note of pacification, in which the peasantry were exhorted to refrain from excesses and violence and to await Parliament's decision.

Group of Tail Didn't Vote.
The vote was taken at the close of a 12-hour sitting, in which it seemed probable that the address would be rejected entirely by the combined votes of the right and left wings of the House again the centre party. The address was saved by the abstention from voting of 101 members of the Group of Tail, and sympathizers with that faction who favored a more radical measure. There were only 124 votes all constitutional democrats for the address and 53 against it. The minority comprised Count Hayden and Michael Stakovich, a marshal of the nobility, and other members of the right with a few extremists from the Socialist camp.

The Czar Hesitates.
At the council held at Peterhof Wednesday night the camarilla came out strongly in favor of dissolving Parliament, but, according to the best information, the Emperor hesitated, and at the moment of adjournment refused to agree to a dissolution, though his final decision was postponed.

Rely on Intervention.
Nevertheless, the more moderate faction of the Constitutional Democrats, comprehending that the Government can hardly avoid the issue, shrink from making the appeal to the country, which may involve a climb-down. They seriously believe that the advocates of a dissolution of Parliament, realizing that making the appeal would be equivalent to a declaration of civil war, count upon the active intervention of Austria and Germany, which, according to the official Russia, have agreed in principle on sending troops across the border to aid in the suppression of an agrarian uprising, should the Russian Government formally request it.

The Russia's announcement created a tremendous sensation. It is stated that the decision of the two neighboring powers was based on fear that the execution of the principles of the constitution of their property in Russia would constitute a danger to them.

"The King's Head."
The Reich declares that if the Government adopts the desperate expedient of calling in Austrian and German troops to put down a civil war, the result will not be the same as in 1848, when a Russian army saved the Hapsburg dynasty. The paper declares that the people will rally under the banner of Parliament, as they did in England under that of the English Parliament at the time of Charles I. "With probably a similar result, namely, the loss of the King's head."

Stoessel Condemned.
The commission appointed to investigate the surrender of Port Arthur, recommends that Gen. Stoessel (the former commander, be dismissed from the army and shot, that Lieut.-Gen. Fock, who commanded the fourth Siberian division at Port Arthur, be dismissed from the army and undergo a year's hard labor; that Gen. Hais, chief of staff of Gen. Stoessel, be dismissed and banished; and that Admiral Alexieff, former viceroy in the Far East, Lieut.-Gen. Smirnov, commander of the Port Arthur fortress, and Gen. Vernander be reprimanded. The formal report of these officers will take place shortly. An attempt was made yesterday to assassinate Count Todleben, aide-de-camp to Emperor Nicholas, the revolver bullet grazing his head. The would-be assassin escaped.

Troops Powerless.
Moscow, July 20.—A landlord, fleeing from Bobrov (in the Province of Veronesch, where a peasant uprising has taken place), has arrived here and gives a frightful picture of the devastation. He describes the losses in the province as colossal.

The troops are powerless to cope with the peasants, who are marching in large bands, destroying practically everything. Not more than one-tenth of the estates are spared. The movement was started by the refusal of the Bobrov district to agree to an advance of wages to the farm women.

Town in Flames.
Samara, Russia, July 20.—The whole town of Syzran, Province of Simbirsk, is in flames. The inhabitants are fleeing to Samara and Saratoff.

Syzran is situated on a river of that name near its confluence with the Volga, and 70 miles north of Simbirsk. It is a busy commercial and industrial place, having a population of over 32,000.

Forest Man Hurt.
Detroit, July 20.—Stepping out of a moving 'Woodward avenue car late Wednesday night, William Gammon, 51 years old, of Forest, Ont., was thrown to the pavement with great force, sustaining injuries, which may result in his death.

\$200,000 For the Poor.
London, July 20.—(C. A. P.)—In a speech in the Commons, announcing the appropriation of £200,000 in aid of the unemployed, John Burns approved the £6,000 last year in emigrating 250 persons.

Prison For 18 Months.
Galt, July 20.—Judge Blake yesterday sentenced J. J. Groves to 18 months in the Central Prison for stabbing William West on the 10th inst.

OUR FORBIDDEN FRUIT

Free Trade in Canada Described by Hon. N. A. Belcourt.

Mutual Ignorance the Danger to the Future of British Unity, Says Australian Agent at the Inauguration of the New Liberal Colonial Club in London For Study and Discussion—Other Colonial Speakers Heard.

London, July 20.—(C. A. P.)—The Earl of Durham presided at a dinner last night on the inauguration of the New Liberal Colonial Club, just organized to study and discuss colonial questions from a Liberal standpoint. Proposing the toast of the British Dominions beyond the seas, the chairman said: "Liberals in the past had given colonies self-government. If they wished to maintain the unity of the empire all must work together apart from political party considerations in the cause of the British Dominions beyond the seas."

Hon. N. A. Belcourt of Ottawa said that the act was unfortunately for Canada, forbidden fruit, (but he rejected to observe that at home the country enjoyed liberal property from the use of the system. The Liberal Colonies Club would render the greatest service to Canada by taking a sympathetic view of Canadian affairs. Full justice could not be done unless they witnessed its wants and possibilities as seen on the spot.

Others present were Sir Sanford Fleming and Hon. Col. Campbell of Winnipeg.

POWER PERMITS.

Two U. S. Companies Get Temporary Permission to Import From Canada 25,000 Horse Power Each.

Washington, July 20.—In accordance with the granting authority to the Secretary of War to regulate and control the waters of Niagara River for the preservation of Niagara Falls, Secretary Taft has announced that temporary permits will be granted power companies to take the following amounts of water:

Niagara Falls Power Co., 8,600 cubic feet per second.

Niagara Power Co., 4,000 cubic feet per second.

Lockport Hydraulic Co., 500 cubic feet from the Erie Canal, and 333 cubic feet from the lower level of the same canal at Lockport.

The Niagara, Lockport and Ontario Power Co. is granted permission to receive into the United States electric current equivalent to 25,000 horse-power daily from the Ontario Power Co. of Niagara Falls, Canada, and the Niagara Falls Power Co. not to exceed 25,000 horse-power of electrical current daily.

These last two permits are the only ones granted for the taking of electricity generated in Canada into the United States, and the Secretary of War states that it will be necessary for him to make a thorough investigation before granting permanent permits for such transmission.

A statement shows that under the law the amount of water which he can permit to be taken is limited to 15,600 cubic feet a second, and he says that it does not seem to be necessary at this time to grant permits to companies which are not actually in operation.

FIND BODY ON TRACK.

Cries of "Murder" Previously Startle Residents Near Railway.

Orillia, July 20.—About midnight Tuesday night cries of "murder" awakened the residents near the railway station.

Shortly after the crew of a freight train found the mangled remains of a man, ever whom their train had passed, lying beside the track.

He was identified as Robert Barbour, who had been round town for a few days, and had been employed on the new C. P. R. line at Coldwater for a short time.

An inquest was opened last night and adjourned until Wednesday afternoon next, when the conductor and others will give evidence.

SAY GUATEMALA WON.

It is Officially Declared Salvadorean Army Was Destroyed.

Guatemala City, July 20.—This official account of the fighting at Pizana and Metapan, July 17, was communicated to the Associated Press yesterday.

"The last two battles, fought before 5 o'clock Wednesday morning, July 16, when the armistice began, were won by the Guatemalans, who defeated the Salvadoreans in Metapan, completely destroying them. If a few remained in the fortifications at Pizana, it was because the armistice which found them there was respected. Reports contradicting these facts are false."

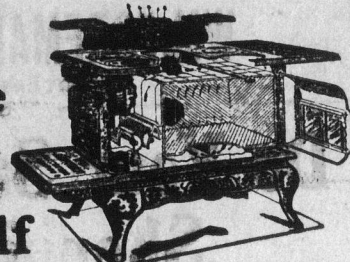
Promptness Saves Burning Child.

Murray had a narrow escape from being burned to death yesterday, playing with companions, who had made torches out of "cat-tails," by saturating them with kerosene. The child's clothing caught fire and in an instant she was enveloped in flames. Joseph Lowry, who was passing on a wheel and Mrs. Foy both hurried to the rescue. They worked heroically to smother the flames, but before this was accomplished the child had been severely burned about the arms and legs.

Gasoline Railroad to Canada.

Albany, N. Y., July 20.—The Malone, Fort Covington and Hopkins Point Railway Co. in its certificate of incorporation filed yesterday, declared that it is to be a street surface railroad to be operated by gasoline as a motive power. The road is to run from Malone Junction, in the village of Malone, Franklin County, to Hopkins Point, in the town of Dundas, County of Huntingdon, Quebec, Canada, 18 miles in all.
