# FOREIGNER FALLS BETWEEN **COACHES AND IS KILLED**

Fatal Accident Which Occured Near Fletcher Early this Morning

Body And The Head Was

An unknown man was killed at two o'clock this morning on the Grand Trunk tracks about two miles west

of Jeannette's Creek.

The man was standing on the platform between two coaches, when he slipped and fell to the rails be-

The coaches following ran over his prostrate form, and when he was afterwards picked up, life was ex-As soon as it was known that the man had fallen off the platform, the train was brought to a standstill. When he was picked up it was found that both legs had been severed from the trunk, and his head was badly

rushed.

Nothing could be found on his clothing to identify him by, with the exception of a through ticket purchased in Dukota for Germany.

As the fatality took place in the Township of Basex, the coroner at Windsor was at once notified, and it is likely an inquest will be held.

As far as can be learned the dead man was one of a party of Norwegians from Dukota, who had bought through ticke's for a point in Germany.

The foreigners, it seems, had a couple of bottles of whiskey with them and they had been drinking quite freely. All had become quite intoxicated.

The deceased walked out to the platform when the train was about two mile; west of Jeannette's Creek. Being quite tipsy he lost his equilibrium while standing on the platform, and fell ito the rails beneath. When he was afterwards picked up he was found to be horribly mangled.
