Meeting of Civil Engineers.
Toronto, Jan. 31.—The Canadian So-
ciety of Engineers had an interesting
day yesterday. About 150 members are
registered. The morning session was
devoted to reading the reports of the
council on the past year's work. An
increase in membership of 123 was re-
ported, making a total of 1,389. The
receipts for the year showed an in-
crease of more than \$1,000 over 1904.
The society has no liabilities and the
assets amount to over \$27,000.

Work and the Eyes.
The influence of occupations upon
the eyesight is strikingly illustrated
by statistics collected among the
schools of Germany and France. In
Germany it has been shown that 50
per cent. of those engaged in the so
called liberal professions suffer more
or less from myopia, or shortness of
sight, whereas among laborers the per-
centage drops to 5 and among pen-
sants to only a half of 1 per cent. The
remarkable growth of myopia with in-
crease of attention demanded by
school work is indicated by the fact
that the eyes of only 6 per cent. of the
scholars in the primary schools of
France are affected, but those of more
than 20 per cent. in the secondary
schools. In the College Rollin 15 per
cent. of the scholars have myopia in
the lower grades, 32 per cent. in the
third grade and 55 per cent. in the
courses in philosophy.

The Bridge of Sighs.
A visit to Venice would not be com-
plete without at least a glimpse at the
famous Bridge of Sighs. Celebrated in
song and story, in history and in ro-
mance, this structure has become a
favorite with the artists who now
flock to the "Pride of the Sea," as
Venice used to be known, and come
back laden with canvases showing
Venetian architecture and gondolas
on the Rio della Paglia and connects the
dual palace with the carceri, or pris-
ons. It dates from 1591 and is an ellip-
tical arch thirty-two feet above the
water, inclosed at the sides and arched
overhead. The bridge contains two sep-
arate passages through which prison-
ers were led to trial or to hear their
doom pronounced. Over this bridge,
too, they were often led on their way
to execution. Many a person in days
gone by, when justice was not meted
out with as much fairness as now,
went over the bridge to meet a tragic
fate when not guilty of any crime.
