VACCINATION LAW IGNORED.

20,000 Warrants Are Out—Great State of Affairs at Derby, England.

An extraordinary position of affairs has arisen at Derby as the result of twenty years' official neglect to enforce the vaccination acts.

It is estimated that there are no fewer than 20,000 defaulters in the town against whom distress warrants have been issued, but not executed.

Representations have from time to time been made to the Home Office with a view to enforcing the law, and Mr. Akers-Douglas has now sent an ultimatum which has caused some consternation. He has informed the water committee, that unless the police take steps to execute the warrants he will withdraw the Government grant towards the aid of the police, which last year amounted to £2,000.

The Town Council, on receipt of the communication, instructed the chief constable to put the law into operation; but, apart from the formal nature of the task, there is the additional difficulty of finding an auctioneer to conduct the sales.

All the auctioneers who have been applied to have declined to do what they consider is a serious task, and so far the water committee has heard of only one man who is willing to undertake the work.

He is a London auctioneer, and has expressed his willingness to sell the trained goods for a fee of twenty guineas in addition to his hotel and travelling expenses. In many cases, however, the fine amounts to only one shilling and as all the expenses attached to the watch committee feel that it would be unfair to place further burdens on the shoulders of the anti-vaccinationists.

As soon as an auctioneer can be obtained at a reasonable fee an attempt will be made to execute all the 20,000 warrants. Lively scenes will then be expected.

In the House of Commons the subject was brought to the notice of the Home Secretary by Sir Thomas Roe.

Mr. Akers-Douglas said he had been in communication with the Derby watch committee, and he was glad to learn that some effort was now being made to carry out the law. If the suggested number of defaulters—20,000—was even approximately accurate it resulted strongly to the evil which resulted from the failure to enforce the law.

The Home Secretary added that he knew of no other large towns where the police had so entirely failed to enforce the orders of the justices as they had at Derby.

KEEPING TOWNS CLEAN.

Valuable Advice Gleaned From A Recently Issued Appeal.

Especially for a town which seeks to attract tourists or investors, it is a great advantage if everything about it has a well kept and prosperous appearance, says The Pathfinder. The mayor of Denver has brought about a notable change in that city by issuing an appeal to the citizens as follows. The example could be followed elsewhere:

If your street front, residence or fence is dull or dingy, old or faded, if your awning is old, torn or faded, get a new one.

If your sidewalk, fence or gate needs repairing, fix it.

Destroy the young weeds that are starting on your property and on your neighbor's property.

If your advertising sign is old or faded, take it down or repaint it.

Resolve never to throw paper in the streets.

Burn all the rubbish possible. Allow no one to throw it on the streets, alleys or vacant lots.

Promote neatness to the sidewalk. Organize a block improvement society and allow no weeds to grow on sidewalks, alleys or vacant property in your block.

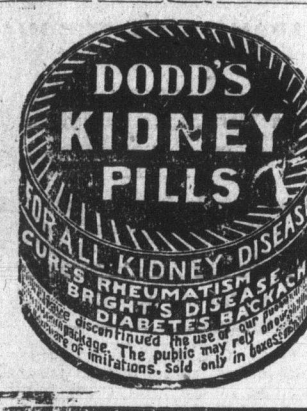
Ask your milkmen, grocers and expressmen to have their wagons painted.

Writer James Douglas Is Unique.

An Irishman by birth, a Scot by descent, and a Londoner by habit is Mr. James Douglas, the well-known writer and critic whose remarkable studies of public celebrities were recently reviewed in M. A. P. According to himself, he was educated at the "Royal University of Irish Womanhood," his wife being a charming Dublin lady, whom he married while both were still in their teens. Works of reference, however, state positively that he was educated at the Belfast Model School and the Royal University of Ireland. Originally he was intended for the Church of Ireland. The subtleties of the Thirty-nine Articles, however, were too much for him and he was in the throes of intellectual despair when he was offered and accepted the post of private secretary to the late Sir Edward Harland, founder of the famous firm of Harland & Wolff. Later, when Sir Edward Harland entered Parliament Mr. Douglas accompanied him to London. Unlike the private secretary, he liked London, and was particularly impressed by the brilliant work of Mr. A. B. Walkley and Mr. George Bernard Shaw in The Star. His literary ambitions fired now by fever heat, he reconnoitred Stonecutter street in search of an opening, and chanced to meet Mr. Ernest Parke on the threshold of The Star building. Mr. Parke asked him to write two "notes" on anything he chose to select from the evening's news. This he did, they were published next morning, and an appointment on the editorial staff followed immediately. The staff met every morning at 7:30 to discuss the news, and the private secretary had to be at Sir Edward Harland's residence in Kensington Palace Gardens by 10 a. m. So Mr. Douglas had to rise with the milk, rush to the office, write his article, and scurry back to Kensington. The pace was hot, but for some years Mr. Douglas went it, presenting the paradoxical combination of Radical journalist and private secretary to a Conservative M. P., as Sir Edward Harland was. On Sir Edward's death he became assistant editor of The Star and later succeeded Mr. Richard Le Gallienne as that paper's literary critic.
