POLA NEGRI'S BEST PICTURE

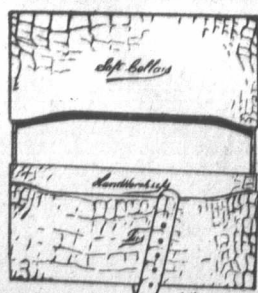

AN IMPORTANT CONFERENCE

Since the purchase of our new fire equipment there have been frequent calls for assistance from sections outside the town limits, and much as the town authorities would like to be able to respond this can only be done at the risk of the efficiency of the department at home. The Council recognizes the somewhat difficult situation in which the town is placed, and at the meeting this evening will suggest a solution of the problem which ought to readily appeal to all those interested.
