Two Drowning Fatalities

Mr. Jesse Whiteway received a message yesterday from Burnt Point, B.D.V., intimating that the little son of Mr. Ishmael Tucker of that place had been drowned in a pond about a mile from his home on Saturday. The little lad who was twelve years old, was an only son. A message similar to the above was received by the Deputy Minister of Justice from Magistrate Vatcher, with the additional information that the body had been recovered.

Yesterday evening the Inspector General was advised by wire from the police officer at Wabana that the body of Margaret Ivany, wife of Silas Ivany, blacksmith, had been found in a pond there. It is believed that the unfortunate woman suicided. She had been ill for about eighteen months and was greatly depressed. Beside her husband, three sons and two daughters survive her.

Vocational Training For Veterans

Applications For Re-training Courses Not Diminishing—40 Considered Last Meeting

Hon. J. M. Kent presided over the last session of the Civil Re-Establishment Committee, when some forty applications for courses in retraining were considered, and 30 granted; 15 extensions in courses were also allowed.

The full Committee was present, and the report of the sub-committee on the agricultural scheme and land settlement question was read and fully discussed. The idea outlined by the sub-committee and submitted to the Minister of Agriculture and Mines appears elsewhere in these columns.

The employment report showed that 16 men had been placed in positions during the past week: The Royal Stores, A. E. Hickman Co., Job Bros., Ayre & Sons, Harvey & Co., and the Reid Nfld. Co., being the employers who found vacancies for some of the veterans listed; 96 men are still out of work.

Man Severely Hurt

A man named Purchase, while working in the machine shops of the Reid Nfld. Co., was severely hurt just before noon today. While attending to a large driving wheel of an engine, it fell on one of his feet, crushing it severely and breaking the bones. Dr. Fallon was summoned by telephone, and after attending the man, who suffered great pain, ordered him to hospital, where the X-rays will be used on the injured member.

The S. S. "Thetis" Strikes Young Harps

The first real sealing news of any value reached Job Bros. & Co. early this morning from Capt. William Winsor of the "Thetis." The message reads as follows: "Got 4,000 young harps yesterday; struck main patch; ice 'all gone to pieces; impossible to do much, big swell heaving in; killed and panicked 4,000." The Thetis does not give her position, but the ship owners in discussing the news this morning are of the opinion that Capt. Winsor is well South of the rest of the fleet. To-night's news will be awaited with much interest. It is evident that the main body of seals are South of the fleet, and Captain Winsor's report of ice conditions does not tally with the reports we have been receiving to date. As already reported, some of the ships are getting short of coal and will shortly have to return to port.
