BRITISH ELECTIONS.

The ballots cast in the recent elec-
tions in Great Britain were counted
yesterday and the result showed an
overwhelming victory for the Con-
servation government the latest returns
showing upwards of 500 Conservative
seats.

The outcome is a great personal
victory for Mr. Lloyd George. It is
an expression of gratitude and ad-
miration from the masses of the Brit-
ish people for the wonderful little
Welshman who has been the most
outstanding figure of the Empire, and
perhaps the world, in the struggle
against Germany, and who has ex-
ercised a greater influence in the
achievement of final victory than any
other statesman.

Every department of which he has
been the head has obtained extraor-
dinary results. As Chancellor of the
Exchequer at the commencement of
the war he won the enthusiastic
praise of leading financial men for
his prompt, sagacious steps in aver-
ting serious financial dislocation, and
providing for a system of war finance
which has been found to be as im-
pregnable as the Rock of Gibraltar.
As Minister of Munitions he con-
verted the country into a vast work-
shop, the war output of which has as-
tounded the world. As Prime Min-
ister he gave dominating leadership to
the whole kingdom.

It was Lloyd George who placed
Geddes at the head of the Admiralty,
Rhonda at the head of the Food
Board and at the head of important
other services the ablest minds of the
country. Each has stated that but
for Mr. Lloyd George's persistent ef-
forts there would not have been unity
of command and he would not have
been the commander-in-chief of the
Allied forces on land. And, greater

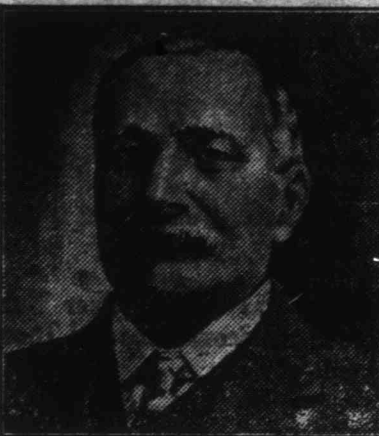

than all these, the British Premier
has been the most powerful inspirer
and moulder of national sentiment
and effort. He enrolled behind him
the masses of the country in a ver-
itable crusade for a righteous cause.
It is because of this remarkable
record of his leadership that the Con-
servation Government was elected by a
majority. The Man in the Street
voted for Mr. Lloyd George. He has
driven down Arthur Henderson the
Labor Leader. He has rejected Mr.
Asquith, Mr. McKenna and Sir John
Simon, and, in this connection, in the
enthusiasm of the moment he has
done some things he will regret. He
even elected Lieut.-Col. Grant Mer-
den, the Canadian connected with the
fearful Calcutta Scandal, who the
London Times expressed the hope
would be defeated.

SCHLESWIG-HOLSTEIN

One of the interesting radiations
of Europe will be the determi-
nation of the inhabitants of this
portion of Prussia known as Schles-
wig-Holstein as to whether they will
be Danes or Germans. The common
impression is that this province was
ravished from Denmark by the greedy
Prussians, an impression that is
only correct as far as the greed of
the Prussians is concerned. Den-
mark's title to Schleswig-Holstein is
far from being clear; in fact, it may
be said that this territory never was
a part of Denmark, and furthermore,
that the people were to arms on one
occasion to keep from being incorpo-
rated into Denmark.

The injustice that was done to
Schleswig-Holstein by Bismarck lies
not so much in its separation from
Denmark as in forcing the people to
become a portion of Prussia. What-
ever may be the sentiments of a ma-
jority of the population today, it is
a fair assumption that in Bismarck's
day Schleswig-Holstein wanted to be-
come a German state. Instead, Bis-
marck, by his cynical manipulations,
made it a part of Prussia.

The history of Schleswig-Holstein,
like that of most of the European
states, is largely dynastic history, and
is not of great worth today when we
come to apply the theory of self-de-
termination. The revolt in Bismarck's
day Schleswig-Holstein wanted to be-
come a German state. Instead, Bis-
marck, by his cynical manipulations,
made it a part of Prussia.

In spite of this dynastic history,
the fact remains that the people of
Denmark for 500 years believed that
Schleswig should be a part of Den-
mark. Schleswig was Danish, Hol-
stein German, but there had been
agreements in the past that they
should never be separated. In 1848
the king of Denmark announced his
intention of incorporating Schleswig
into his kingdom and brought on a
revolt in the duchies, a revolt that
was aided by the Liberals of Prussia.
The revolt in Schleswig-Holstein
cannot, however, be viewed as one
directed entirely against Den-
mark. Revolution was the order of
the day in 1848, and almost any ex-
cuse served for one. Still, there was
enough opposition to indicate that
the incorporation of the province
with Denmark was not then popular.
Since that time there has been an in-
crease in the German population of
Schleswig, until probably only the
northern portion of the province can
be said to be Danish, that portion
north of the Eider-Kiel canal.

The Danes, who are notoriously
clear-headed, are modest in their
claims and are careful in their state-
ments. From Danes one hears noth-
ing about "stolen provinces," because
there have been no provinces stolen
from Denmark. All Denmark wants
is a vote on the question, with the
understanding that the portion which

elects to become a part of Denmark
shall be permitted to do so. In all
probability this will leave the Kiel
canal to Prussia, but Denmark isn't
anxious to have the canal if she is
obliged to take a lot of trouble making
Prussians along with it.

SWEEPING VICTORY FOR
COALITION GOVERNMENT

leading suffragist, was defeated, the
result there being: R. B. Stoker, Co-
alition Unionist, 12,447; W. Butler-
worth, 2,699; Mrs. Lawrence, Labor-
ite, 2,985.
Grant Morden Elected.
In the Brentford and Chiswick Dis-
trict of Middlesex, Mr. Oliver Str-
achey was defeated. The result there
was: Lieut.-Col. Grant Morden, a Can-
adian and Coalition Unionist, 9,077;
W. Haywood, a Laborite, 2,620; Mrs.
Strachey, Independent, 1,263.

The returns show the defeat of a
woman candidate, Mrs. Charlotte Des-
part, sister of Viscount Field-Mar-
shal French, Lord Lieutenant of Ire-
land. She was defeated in North
Battersea by Richard Morris, a Co-
alition Liberal. Morris received 7,221
votes and Mrs. Despart, who was a
Labor candidate, 2,424 votes.

Sir Harry Brittain, secretary of the
English branch of the Pilgrims' So-
ciety, was returned for the Eastern
Division of Middlesex. Sir Harry, a
Coalition Unionist, received 11,671
votes to 4,441 for R. Dunscombe, a La-
borite.

Miss Viola Markham (Mrs. Carru-
thers) sister of the late Sir Arthur
Markham, failed in her attempt to
gain the seat for the Mansfield Divi-
sion of Nottingham formerly held by
her brother. The result was: Wil-
liam Carter, Labor, 8,957; G. W. Jar-
rett, Coalition, 6,678; Miss Markham,
Liberal, 4,660; Dr. Tarachant, In-
dependent, 878.

Asquith's Defeat.

London, Dec. 28.—Rt. Hon. H. H.
Asquith, the veteran leader of the
Liberal Party, has gone down in de-
feat with a majority of his followers.
The former prime minister was de-
feated in his East Fife constituency,
which he had represented for thirty-
two years, by Colonel Sir Alexander
Sprot, who had fought him in several
previous elections as a straight Un-
ionist candidate. Sir Alexander is a
country gentleman and a resident of
Fifehouse. It was known that the for-
mer Prime Minister faced a stiff fight
but it had hardly been expected that
he would be beaten so badly as the
vote shows. In addition to losing the
votes of the Coalition Liberals, how-
ever, Mr. Asquith had the disadvan-
tage that under the recent Re-Distri-
bution Act, the boundaries of East
Fife had been extended to take in
a considerable Unionist element.

Ramsay MacDonald, Beaten.
Ramsay MacDonald, a Socialist
Laborite, was overwhelmingly de-
feated by the opposing Coalition-La-
borite candidate.
