## Miss Boulton's Eloquence Has Awakened New Interest In Daughters of the Empire

Representative of National Chapter on Coast to Coast Tour Addresses Members of Legislature and Students of Educational Institutions.

Miss Constance R. Boulton, who is visiting the Chapters of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire throughout Canada, is having a busy visit in Fredericton.

This morning she spoke to the High School students and also addressed two gatherings of students at the University of New Brunswick. This afternoon she spoke before the Provincial Normal School students and will attend the Legislature to hear the Budget Speech of Hon. Dr. Landry.

This evening Miss Boulton leaves for St. John, whence she will continue her trip through the Maritime Provinces to Moncton, Dorchester, Amherst, Halifax, Sydney, C. B., and other centres, thus completing her tour from coast to coast.

In Fredericton she has awakened a new interest in the work of the Daughters of the Empire as well as making many friends and admirers.

### Entertained at Elmcroft.

Yesterday afternoon Miss Boulton was the guest of honor at a tea given at Elmcroft by Mrs. H. G. C. Ketchum and Mrs. A. J. Gregory, regent of the Sir Howard Douglas Chapter. Mrs. G. C. VanWart, regent of the Provincial Chapter, and the members of that Chapter were also present and an address was delivered by Miss Boulton, who was presented with a beautiful bouquet of American beauty roses.

### Address at Legislature.

Later the party drove to the Legislature, where Miss Boulton delivered an address to the Members, following adjournment at 5:30 o'clock. Accompanying Miss Boulton were Mrs. VanWart and Mrs. John Black and the party were received by Premier Fleming, who presided over the session. Miss Boulton said she wondered why the very high compliment had been paid her to being asked to address so important a body as the Legislature of New Brunswick and she could only assume that it was admiration for the work that the Daughters of the Empire were doing that prompted the invitation. She appreciated the honor most highly and the occasion would be a red letter day in her life.

She had asked Premier Fleming if she was the first lady to whom the honor had been extended and was told she was not, and this showed the delightful courtesy of the New Brunswick legislators extended to ladies, a matter in which they were ahead of the legislators of Ontario, and she would go back and tell Sir James Whitney so. Her mission to Eastern Canada was to convey fraternal greetings to the eastern Chapters of the order and endeavor to get a closer co-operation in the work that the Daughters of the Empire are doing.

The order was founded in 1909 as the result of the enthusiasm arising out of the Boer war. When the war was over the enthusiasm was not allowed to wane, but it had become stronger and stronger until now the order had reached its fourteenth birthday. They had two hundred Chapters in various parts of Canada, with over 13,000 members banded together to do the great work for which the order was founded.

The order was essentially a political organization, but the word political was used in a different sense than usually the case, for it had no reference to party. The members were interested in great national issues apart from party, and were united from the point of Imperial Unity. A leading feature of their work is to unify and assimilate the various elements which go to make up the population of Canada.

The reason in this regard in Western Canada was considerable when the immense bodies of foreigners which were continually pouring into the country were taken into consideration. These people must be brought into touch with the ideas that Canada stands for and it is the work of the Daughters of the Empire to see that this is done. The order was striving to encourage a national spirit. Soldiers, cadet corps and boy scouts were their special care, and another duty was to look after the graves of Canadians who fell in the South African war.

Miss Boulton made an earnest appeal for the assistance of all to encourage the work of the Chapters, for they were struggling against many little prejudices. The gift to the Overseas Dominions of powers of self-government had not weakened their loyalty to the Mother land; and as the promotion of peace was one of the leading objects of the order they felt that the unity of the British Empire was the greatest factor of all.

In maintaining the peace of the world, although they did all in their power to encourage national defence, every citizen should be taught the lesson of individual responsibility and made to see that he has something to protect.

### The Premier's Sympathy.

Premier Fleming said Miss Boulton was mistaken in her references to the honor of the occasion; it was on the members of the Legislature that the honor was conferred and the pleasure also to be able to listen to her stirring words. He was surprised at the large membership of the order, and their object appeared to be one of engrossing interest. Nothing would appeal to a patriotic man or woman more than a project for unifying the Empire. It was a subject which demanded their thoughtful interest. In New Brunswick this was especially the case because the people of this Province were peculiarly situated; on the one side they had the United Empire Loyalists, who, tired of hardship and struggle in a foreign country, had come back again to live under the flag for which they and their forefathers fought, and, some of them died; on the other side were the representatives of the French Acadians who had proved themselves some of their best citizens. Looking back into history he noted with satisfaction how much of the present satisfactory condition was due to the French element in the population.

The blend of the two races must bring a splendid spirit of Imperialism. The strengthening of Imperial ties was a duty everyone should be proud to take part in. In this great country, said the Premier, we need the unifying process to bring the population of the various provinces into harmony, so that the greatest good might be accomplished. A strong national sentiment would overcome all difficulties, and the greatest factor in the peace of the world today was, as Miss Boulton said, a strong and united British Empire.

Attorney General Clarke in proposing a very hearty vote of thanks to Miss Boulton for her eloquent and inspiring address said he felt sure he only voiced the sentiments of everyone present when he expressed how grateful they were for the privilege of having heard her.

### L. P. D. Tilley, of St. John.

Mr. Tilley, in seconding, said he had often heard and read of the Daughters of the Empire, and he had now heard it much pleasure some account of their work. He wished them God Speed in their efforts.

Speaker Dickson in tendering the vote of thanks to Miss Boulton, also expressed his pleasure in having heard the privilege of listening to so eloquent a lady.

## CHEAPER MONEY FOR THE FARMER

The Government to Sanction the Establishment of Rural Banks Through Canada.

Ottawa, March 12.—A measure providing for cheap agricultural credits, which will enable the farmers of Canada to obtain money at a reasonable rate of discount, will be introduced in the Commons in the course of the next ten days.

The bill will have the way and give parliament sanction and assistance to the establishment of rural banks throughout the Dominion, along the same lines and with similar objects as those which now exist having independent of Parliament, and without its protection, in the Province of Quebec.

The details of the measure are practically complete and it is understood that they incorporate all that is best and which has been most successful in the operation of agricultural credit banks in this and other countries.

During the past year the number of rural credit banks in the Province of Quebec have nearly doubled, and the Government feels that the giving to the movement the protection and encouragement of Parliament will result in their establishment in every rural constituency in the country to the general advantage of agriculturists.

The matter has been under consideration by the Government since last session, when the whole question was explained by Hon. Arthur Meighen. The wider and more comprehensive

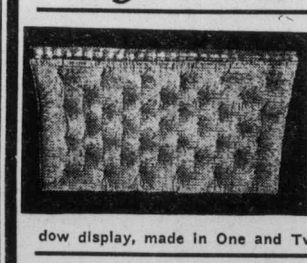
