**Many Questions Answered in Parliament Yesterday and Board Cleared for Serious Work**

A Western Member Moves That a Farmer on Whose Land a Prospector Might Strike Oil Should Share in the Proceeds Derived.

[Special despatch to The Daily Gleaner.] Ottawa, March 5.—The House yesterday was evidently suffering from the effects of "the morning after," which served to accentuate the foolishness of an all night session in Parliament as well as in individuals. After a brief session it adjourned to enable members and others to make up arrears of sleep.

It was not a fully futile session, however, as the opportunity was taken to clear off many of the two hundred questions and motions which have accumulated on the order paper in the past two weeks. Much of the information so elicited was of great interest. The second reading was also given to Mr. McMaster's bill to prevent ministers of the crown carrying into the cabinet with them any of the evidence of acquaintance with the mammon of unrighteousness, in the shape of directorships. He would make it harder for a rich man to enter the cabinet than for a camel to go through the eye of a needle. The support and opposition to the bill lined up pretty much as might be expected. There will probably be many who will agree with the suggestion of Mr. Stevens, of Vancouver, that too much legislation is being passed, and it is likely that the infant of Mr. McMaster's parentage will go to that conveyance to parliamentary limbo, the hoist.

Mr. Lemieux wants condign punishment inflicted upon whoever was responsible for the destruction of some hundreds of tons of parliamentary papers and other valuable documents, and the Premier said that if the culprit could be located he would get his. Mr. Griesbach, of Edmonton, urged that the western farmer, upon whose land a prospector might strike oil, should share with the Government and the discoverer in the proceeds. The Premier did not seem to favor the proposal, but it was not killed entirely. It will come up again after we hear what the Interior Department thinks of it. When six o'clock came and the Speaker said he would now leave the chair everyone was pleased.

Comment on Vote on Amendment. A review of the stricken field today reveals the fact that there is nothing more uncertain than the vote on a contentious question such as that upon which the House has spent the past two weeks. The general estimate of the probable majority of the Government was fifteen—or ten below that was actually polled last night. This seems like poor estimating, but the truth is that Heaven seems to have been on the side of the biggest battalion. Since the session opened the Prime Minister himself has been in fear that the Government might be defeated, so black was the outlook with crickets and other absentees, but in the last day or two everything began to break for the Government. The Government whips worked wonders, almost going to the length of crying, like Captain Jacques Periard before Verdun, "Debout, Les Morts!"—Arise.

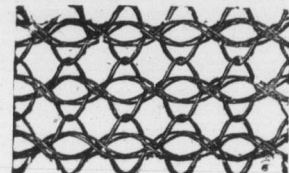
