VICTIM OF FIENDS.

Bloodhounds Lead the Pursuers to Home of a Negro Woman.

Cairo, Ill., Nov. 9.—Children playing in an alley this morning found the striped and mutilated body of Miss Annie Pelley, a clerk in a local dry goods store. She had been choked to death and fiendishly assaulted. Pieces of cloth strewn along the alley showed that she had struggled desperately for life for a distance of more than a city block.

Bloodhounds were secured, and after two or three failures, they picked up a trail which led to the home of a negro woman. Different bloodhounds led pursuers to the same place on eight successive tests. Three negro men and one woman were arrested.
