The father of a little girl baby is cast by the sea on a barren shore with some associates, while the child and the mother are taken on board a vessel that is putting out to sea to escape the danger of the shores of the Island of Martinique. At the close of the chapter a packet found with the child after the mother's death announces her identity, and the fortune which is to be hers. Fourteen chapters of two reels each will complete this serial which promises to surpass any of the serials on the market. The story is well handled and the production is elaborate in its make up.
