**Terrible Disaster In Illinois River**

About 150 People Drowned or Trampled to Death When Steamer Struck an Obstruction and Sank

Approximately 150 people were drowned or trampled to death at mid night Friday night when the excursion steamer Columbia carrying more than six hundred people struck an obstruction in the Illinois River and sank.

The excursion party started from Pekin, fifteen miles distant from Peoria, Ill., early in the evening, and when the return trip to Pekin was about half completed the steamer ran into an obstruction on the Peoria shore in the fog smashing a hole in her bow. The captain signalled full speed astern and as soon as the vessel pulled clear of the log or rock she began to settle and within a few minutes sank, carrying many persons down.

Soon after the steamer struck a panic occurred among the passengers and many men, women and children jumped into the water with out securing life preservers. Those who could swim reached shore, which was only a few feet away. The second deck of the boat where the dance hall is located, was crowded when the crash came and it was here that many were crushed to death in the panic.

When the boat touched bottom the water reached the staterooms immediately below the pilot house on the listed side. The pilot when he found his boat was sinking, sent distress signals and within a short time boats from various directions came to the rescue and began to pick up those struggling in the water but on account of the darkness their efforts were badly hampered.

Peoria, Ill., July 8.—Seventy-seven bodies had been recovered tonight from the wreck of the excursion boat Columbia, which sank in the Illinois River Friday night with about 500 persons aboard. Red Cross figures show twenty-two persons missing. A diver declared he believed there are about twenty-five more bodies in the wreckage.

**Flax Raising in N. B.**

The Flax Fibre Development Association of Regina, Sask., announces that it has discovered a process for manufacturing flax straw into binder twine, commercial twine and yarns for weaving into heavy soaking and towelling. Heretofore, the flax straw of the three western provinces, amounting to over 1,000,000 tons annually, has been burned after threshing.

It is said that experiments carried out this autumn with the new binder twine showed that it bound 99 per cent. of the sheaves perfectly, a better result than was obtained with sisal twine. A co-operative company is being formed to manufacture the new twine.

Flax can be raised in New Brunswick. A good yield has been obtained in Douglastown school garden.

**American Transport Covington, Sunk by U-Boat**

Former German Sixteen Thousand Ton Steamer Sent Down in War Zone.—Only Six are Missing

Washington, July 5.—The American army transport Covington homeward bound after having landed several thousand soldiers in France, was torpedoed and sunk in the war zone last Monday night. Six members of the crew are missing, but all the other men, with the ship's officers, have been landed at French port. No army personnel or passengers were aboard.

The Covington formerly was the Hamburg-American liner Cincinnati, which was taken over when the United States entered the war.

The Covington was struck while proceeding with a fleet of other transports convoyed by destroyers. The submarine was not sighted. The transport remained afloat until Tuesday when efforts were made by another vessel and two tugs to tow her to port, but she was too badly damaged to keep afloat.

**Classes Below A. Are Re-Examined**

Reclassifying About Finishes—Certain Ages are Allowed Chance of Exemption

St. John, July 8.—The work of re-classifying all young men in the first call of the Military Service Act and the review of all their former medical sheets is being carried out in this district with all possible speed, according to information to hand. The work of re-examining all men in categories below A is daily going on, and it is reported that the work is drawing to a close so far as the city youths are concerned. It is generally believed that nearly all are being notified to report for a medical re-examination.

An officer was placed in charge of the review work and he was supplied with all the medical history sheets and went carefully over each and every one. In the case of any doubt as to their validity he recited the man for re-examination; also cases wherein a low category was given without a good medical reason to support the given class. It is understood, however, that the officer had full authority to recall anyone and it is said that men were recalled regardless of the findings of the medical board when examined previously.

Considerable doubt exists in the minds of many local and prospective soldiers as to the course that will be pursued providing they are given class A. It was learned yesterday that if a man is raised from his former low category to A, and providing he is over twenty-two years of age he is sent in due time before the military tribunal of his district in case good grounds, other than medical, for exemption from military service. If this local tribunal should refuse exemption, he can appeal the case, and follow the same course as men did in the beginning. If he be of the age of twenty-one and twenty-two, all exemption is waived and he is notified by the registrar, whenever required, to report to the Depot Battalion.

The Appeal Division Supreme Court on Friday confirmed the verdict of the jury in the murder case of the King vs. Robert Kierstead Sir Douglas Hazen, Chief Justice, and Judge Grimmer were present. Sir Douglas read the judgement of Judge White, which was the judgement of the Court. Kierstead was convicted of the murder of his wife before Judge Barry at Gagetown, and is now in jail at that place awaiting sentence. The counsel for the accused appealed. It is understood that an application in this case will be made to the Minister of Justice at Ottawa.

**Rev. Mr. Kenyon On Modern Marriage**

Views of Mother and Daughter.

That the modern young man marries the first pretty face he happens to fall in love with, and that the modern young woman marries the first thing that comes along in trousers was the illuminating statement made last evening at the tabernacle by Evangelist Kenyon, who had announced that he was to speak upon the subject, "Why Marriage is a Failure."


