A \$400,000 logging railway up the Shehalis River Valley, a \$1,000,000 mill plant at Chemaimus, a \$200,000 amusement centre at Victoria and a \$200,000 sawmill at Port Coquitlam, with about \$10,000,000 in power plants in the Seave Lake District are some of the more important and a host of smaller projects are also under way.

Practically all Canada's produc-Practically all Canada's production of newsprint for export in March was absorbed by the United States. Of March shipments amounting to 127,583 tons valued at \$9,756,530, the United States received 125,848 tons, valued at 9,617,823. The only other Canadian exports of newsprint of importance were 599 tons to South Africa and 1,027 tons to New Zealand. It is expected that April shipments will show an even greater proportion show an even greater proportion of consignments to the United States.
