the sum of \$2,995.20, while I could only scrape together some \$2,018.38 when the council met in 1891. This, on the face of it, without any examination shows in favor of Mr. Black. But how does he make up his \$2,995.20? An examination of pages 120 and 121 of the auditor's report of 1891 and of the city treasurer's books, will give us the information. By reference to page 120 we find that \$3,800 was received by Mr. Black during the last fiscal year for the sale of debentures. By reference to page 121 we find only \$3,000 of that sum paid, out which
