THERE is now no doubt that the Scott Act, as a temperance measure, is as dead as a door nail. Public opinion is now as decidedly against it, as it was strongly in favor of it a short time ago.

The seasons keep changing, but the attitude of the Government in the matter of the Goderich postmasterhip continues to be one of masterly inactivity. Are they waiting for the "dark horse" to trot up in front of the grand stand?

The election for the division of Birmingham, made vacant by the death of John Bright, is now the subject of discussion amongst the politicians. Should the Gladstonian candidate succeed in capturing the seat, it will be looked upon as a stinging defeat to the so-called Union Liberal cause. At present the chances point that way.

CHARLES RYKERT M.P. for Lincoln, had a lively time in St. Catharines the other night trying to ride the Protestant horse going one way, and the Catholic horse going the other. He said a good many things in favor of Charles Rykert, and amongst others claimed that he had always been upright and honorable in all his dealings with men and parties. Let's see! Is this the same Charles Rykert who was tangled up in the Louis Sand's deal? And if so, why didn't some one show the other side of the shield?

With this issue, the interesting narrative of Mr. Thos. Dark comes to a close. For a number of weeks past it has proved a topic of interest to our readers, and many will regret with us that the story of the old "Forty Niner" has terminated. The story has been well told, the actors in the drama have been well placed, and the trials of the pioneers of the Rockies have been well depicted. We assure our readers will agree with us when we say Mr. Dark is deserving of the thanks of all for placing before the public his version of "Overland to California in the Early Days."

THE Scott Act has "gone up Salt Creek." It served its day, and has now passed to its rest. It was never a perfect measure, and was always difficult of enforcement, but it greatly curtailed the sale of liquor wherever it was in vogue during the three years in which it held sway. More than that, its effects have repeated it, for wherever it has been repeated the first year's experience goes to show that a more sober sentiment prevails than was formerly the case. In Huron county this is the fact. More liquor is indulged in now than when the Scott Act was in force, but the drinking habit is far less extensive than before the Scott Act was carried. Whether the Scott Act was the cause of the abatement or not, we cannot say; but it is a solid fact that the expenditure for alcoholic stimulants is now only a fraction of what it was in previous years under license.

KAFFER'S FOR APRIL

The Gibbs-Channing Portrait of Washington, by Gilbert Stuart, has been engraved as the frontispiece for this year's centennial issue of Harper's Magazine. In further keeping with the spirit and interest of the day, Professor John Bush McMaster opens this April number with a paper on "Washington's Imagery," a charming compound of history and biography, and Monseur D. Conway, in the course of exploring an old usap and many MSS., discovers some reminiscences which will add to our knowledge of the "real" Washington. Bjornstjerne Bjornson contributes his kind and last paper on "Norway and its People." He enables us to read the political mind of Norway, tells why Norway, as a land for tourists, is recognized to be the grandest in Europe, and closes with details in regard to the "excellent illustrations" which T. de Thulstrup and H. W. Ranger have drawn to accompany his articles. Benjamin Constant has prepared twelve drawings of scenes in Tangier and Morocco, and has put into his descriptive articles some of what he calls the "light, whiteness, brilliancy" of the East. Andrew H. Smith, M.D., writes upon "The Family Physician;" John R. Coryell, upon birds that are noted for "Flying under Water;" and Theodore Child, upon "Characteristic Parisian Cafes," illustrated with a characteristic Parisian drawing. Two short stories, the first instalment of a new novel—"A Little Journey in the World"—by Charles Dudley Warner, and the continuation of Constance Fenimore Woolcott's "Lupinus Light;" and the fiction of the Number. Among the six poems is the translation of a Roumanian Ballad, "Childe Mih," and a sonnet by William Wordsworth, with drawings by Alfred Parsons. "Gambions of Abbotford," a hitherto unpublished fragment by Sir Walter Scott, describes his home and its curiosities. George W. Curtis speaks of Washington's Moderation, William Dean Howells encourages several poets, and Charles Dudley Warner dispels a misapprehension about woman's dress.

WIDE AWAKE FOR APRIL

An interesting portrait of John Burroughs at twenty opens the April Wide Awake, as frontispiece, this engraving accompanies Mr. Burroughs' own story of his boyhood, "The Boy John Burroughs; a Gance Backward," telling how he learned to struggle for his "schooling." Another excellent piece of biographical and historical work is by an English writer—Mrs Blathway, entitled "Raleigh and the Potato;" this gives by courtesy of the National Gallery, Dublin, Ireland, a portrait of Lady Raleigh, Sir Walter's wife, also engraving from photographs and especially for Wide Awake, of Haye-Barton farmhouse (Sir Walter's birthplace), of the Raleigh place of worship, the church at Budleigh Salterton, also Sir Walter's residence at Youghal, Ireland, a most picturesque spot, and the garden where the first potatoes were planted in Ireland, and many other interesting illustrations. "A Dash for a Flag" by R. M. Backus, is a spirited story of the Civil War. "The Little Girl of the Okoboko," by Mrs. Clara Doty Bates, is the tale of a great river-fish. "The Ascension Dance," beautifully illustrated by Garnett, gives instructions for a joyous Easter game for children. Mrs. Clafin's behavior that ought to interest parents of all school-girls. The Public School Cookery article has helpful diagrams for "marketing." The romantic story of the famous Braganza diamond is told by Mrs. Goddard O'Brien. "Men and Things," the new department is full to overflowing with bright, original anecdotes, accounts and "short talks." The poems of the number are particularly good. The serials, "Five Little Peppers" by May, by Margaret Sidney, and "David Van and David Crane," by Trowbridge, are jolly readers.

THE TOWN COUNCIL

Report of the Minutes of Last Regular Meeting.

The council met last Friday evening, the 5th inst. All the members present except councillors Holt and Thompson. A letter was read from the Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries offering to put in a fog horn at harbor. On motion this offer was accepted.

Several letters re railway matters were read and referred to be filed.

A communication from Spence & Sons, Montreal, in regard to a coat of arms for the town, was referred to the finance committee with power to act.

The Old's Organ Factory Co. offered to locate in this town, and to employ from 20 to 25 hands, on condition that the town give them a building site of at least three town lots, free use of water, exemption from taxation for ten years, and a loan of \$4,000 without interest, to be repaid at the rate of \$500 per year over, he want to a doctor, and found that it had been broken.

The following accounts were presented: Thos. Hall, packing boxes for kindling wood, \$1.60; W. J. Dundas, carbon case, \$2; Henry Spence, relief orders, \$2.80; A. B. REPORT OF WATERWORKS COMMITTEE

To the Mayor and Council. The waterworks committee advertised for tenders for the boring of a 6 inch hole for the supply of water for fire purposes, and we received two tenders, neither of which, however, were satisfactory. Mr. McEwan has offered to take the contract at \$2 per foot, if given the middle of May for doing the work, and we would recommend his offer be accepted. We would also recommend the putting in of a water heater for fire purposes. In putting in water services some are asking for two connections with the mains, one for house service and one for lawn, and we would ask advice of this council as to what we should do in these cases. We would recommend that a tank be built at the pumping station for holding water for fire purposes, 70 x 10 feet and 10 feet high, with concrete bottom. We also recommend that a 2 inch pipe be used for carrying the water in Court House Square for supplying Court House and fountains.

REPORT OF PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE

To the Mayor and Council. The public works committee would recommend as follows: That at least 500 trees be procured for street planting, the town to plant part of the trees on streets within the fire limits and other places, and part to be distributed free to those ratepayers who may wish to plant, on condition of being planted as directed by street inspector.

That the snow plow offered by Robt. Reid for the sum of \$10, be purchased.

That the application of the baseball, cricket and lacrosse clubs, for the use of the agricultural grounds, which will be read to you this evening, be granted.

That the agricultural grounds be well rolled and bare spots seeded, grounds rented for horse pasture.

A plan for the placing of fountains in the squares will be laid before you which we would recommend be carried out.

This report was adopted with the exceptions of clause 4, which was referred back to the committee to be reported upon at the next meeting of the council, and clause 5, which was left over till the next meeting.

The following petitions were received: From E. R. Watson, asking permission to erect a frame house on lot 849, at the extreme bounds of the fire limits. Referred to public works committee.

From R. S. Williams and others, requesting that the cricket, lacrosse and baseball clubs be allowed the use of the Agricultural Park, the clubs agreeing to fix up the grounds at their own expense.

From Jas. Keag and others, asking that the council would drain and otherwise improve Gibbons street.

From residents of Warren-st., requesting the council to gravel said street.

From residents of Widdler-st., asking the council to drain the said Widdler street.

From dry goods merchants, and also from the hardware dealers, petitioning for the repeal of the early closing by-law. The latter petitions were granted, and by-law ordered to be prepared for the next meeting of the council.

From F. A. and Pridham and other patrons of the electric light, agreeing to take the light for one year at 16 cts. per night, it run until 11 o'clock, and until 12 o'clock on Saturday nights and nights before holidays. Referred to waterworks committee.

Moved by Morton, seconded by Proudfoot, that the mayor call a meeting of the stockholders of the Organ Factory Company—Carried.

The mayor read a letter from the G. T. Railway Company relating to the supplying of water to their property there. Referred to waterworks committee.

The report of the sexton of Maitland Cemetery showed 4 interments, all adults, for the month ending March 31st. The treasurer reported balance on hand \$3,277.46.

The reports of the relief officers were

St George's Ward (3 months), \$7.60; St Andrew's Ward, \$10.75. On motion council adjourned.

Mr Amos Morton, of Brine, Ohio who formerly lived on the Huron Road near Alma, has been in Southport on a visit to his mother and sister. It is fifteen years since Mr. Morton became a resident of the United States and he has prospered well.

The Baptists of Wingham have extended a call to the Rev. Mr. McLeod, of Toronto, to become their pastor. He is a young man who has just finished his college course, and as the said church has been without a pastor for the past twelve months, it is time that some one was in charge.

While Mr Wm. Lobb, of the Maitland concession, Goderich township, was lifting a horse-power a few days ago, he hurt his arm, but, not thinking it serious neglected to get medical advice. As the injured limb failed to get better, however, he went to a doctor, and found that it had been broken.
