## Brazilian **Tars Mutiny**

They also threw a few shells into the city. During the outbreak several officers were killed. The fighting ceased at night, but the revolutionists remained in possession of the two vessels. To-day the battleships with their mutinous crews an-chored outside the bar, awaiting action by the Government. Congress was summoned this afternoon to deal with the situation. Press censorship is strict, and details of the trouble cannot be cabled at this time. It is officially stated that the trouble is not of a political character. It is described as a mutiny among the sailors to enforce certain concessions from their officers, rather than a revolt against the administration. President Fonseca states that for som time the men have been agitating for more pay; they also objected to the practice in the navy of inflicting corporal punishment upon insubordinate or otherwise offending sailors. Following the fighting the mutineers made a formal demand for increased pay and for the abolition of corporal punishment. Then the withdraw to the outer harbor. The mutineers that Congress will finalize a leasure this afternoon, granting them mnesty. It is believed that if this is done the trouble will be at an end. Should Congress refuse amnesty to he mutineers, the subsequent attitude of the latter is in doubt. The situation is tense, and considerable nxiety exists among the people of he city.

LONDON, Nov. 24. A private cable despatch from Rio Janeiro received here shortly before noon to-day says the captain of the Brazilian battleship Minas Gecro was killed during the naval disturbances last night. Earlier despatches conveyed the news that the crews of several warships had mutinied. A rigorous censorship has withheld further de tails. A cablegram also received here to-day from Rio Janeiro says that firing is in progress between the war ships in the harbor there. It is reported in London that Admiral Farquhar, commanding the fourth British cruiser squadron, now at Buenos Ayres, has been ordered to Rio Janeiro. The Admiralty confirmed the report that the fourth squadron was going to Rio Janeiro, but asserted that this was only in pursuance of the original itinerary of the squadron and not connected with the outbreak.

#### St. John's Nfld., Nov. 25, 1910. Scientists Were Eaten by Savages.

Victoria, B.C., Nov. 20.-A mystery of 14 years concerning the fate of the Austrian scientific expedition from the ship Albatross is cleared up by the finding of the remains of the expedition in the Solomon Islands.

The discovery was made by Dr.

Nortcott Deck of the South Sea Evangelical mission. News of the discovery of the remains of the party in the Albatross was received here by the steamship Zealanda, from Australia. The expedition from the Albatross was headed by Baron Von Norbeck. and included Lieut. Budick, Midship man De Beaufort and nine sailors. Dr. Beck found evidence of a massacre on Tatuve Island, and from the

The Austrians, according to the natives, were surprised by the blacks. Baron Von Norbeck was killed by a savage, who crept up behind him. The sailors fought off the blacks after several were wounded, and made

camp where the baron died. In the night the camp was again attacked and only three of the men escaped. They made their way to the coast without learning the fate of their fellows, who remained in captivity. 
