The Sealing Outlook.

The Northern Patch Disposed Of.
Bad News From Gulf.

The news received from the sealing fleet yesterday would go to show that the steel ships have disposed of the patch of seals which they were in and which according to Capt. Geo. Barbour numbered roughly 130,000 seals. The big patch found almost every spring must have been divided and as all the ships both steel and wooden have been accounted for and roughly they have secured about 120,000, so that the outlook is not at all encouraging. The usual stealing of "pans" was in evidence and Capt. Kean had taken from him 30 flags or about 3000 seals. Yesterday forenoon another message was received from Capt. Geo. Barbour of the Beothic, saying:

"All pans on board; total count, 21,000; all ships killed about 130,000. Erik, Diana and Neptune in this patch picking up seals; Diana 5,000; Bloodhound, 15,000; seals very scattered."

During the afternoon Bowring Bros. had this wire from Capt. A. Kean, despatched at 6 p.m. Tuesday:

"24,000 on board; 30 pans stolen. Eagle, Ranger and Aurora in sight, doing nothing. Erik, Diana and Neptune, picking up scattered seals. Newfoundland with 5,000 gone east."

The number of seals which the Neptune reported for according to the message of Tuesday afternoon which was reported yesterday is 1,000. A very poor fare for this fine vessel. The Bloodhound has to date made a good showing in securing 15,000 seals. No figures have been given for the Eagle, Aurora, Ranger or Erik, and the approximate totals to date are:

TWO DEATHS RECORDED.

Diphtheria has spread so rapidly within the past few days that there is good reason now to fear an epidemic of the disease. A boy named Mitchell, 10 years old of Spencer St., developed it this morning as did Susie Jacobs, aged 20, of Prescott St. Both these cases have been sent to Hospital. Two deaths have resulted from the malady within the past 24 hours. Maud Lilly, aged 21, of Casey Street, died yesterday and was buried in the afternoon at the General Protestant Cemetery. Annie Dunne, aged 7, of Topsail Road, also succumbed to the disease this morning. The increase of the fell disease at such an alarming rate should compel the authorities to take active steps to rid the city of this dangerous malady.

At the R. C. Cathedral.

His Grace Archbishop Howley occupied the pulpit at the Cathedral last night and preached the first Lent sermon set down for the Wednesday evenings. The text was taken from St. John in the Apocalypse, chap. 21st, verse 3rd—"Behold the Tabernacle of God with men and He will dwell with them, and they shall be His people and God himself with them shall be their God." His Grace applied those words of revelation to the Church the establishment of which on earth under the teaching of the Apostles followed all the figurative allusions and prophecies made under the Mosaic dispensation. In the olden times from the beginning Almighty God had spoken to his chosen people through Adam, Noah, Abraham and Moses. All those communications with man were a foreshadowing of His intention to dwell "among men in the Tabernacles" which was fulfilled in the Catholic Church where Our Divine Lord was ever present in the Sacrament of the Eucharist. Referring to his previous sermon His Grace again dwelt on the necessity of doing penance as inculcated by John the Baptist and by Jesus Christ Himself. The Israelites were told that the "Kingdom of Heaven was at hand." The Kingdom of Heaven was the new Christian dispensation so long promised to the Jews but about which they had an erroneous idea. The Kingdom of Heaven is the warning referred to by John the Baptist is the Christian Church established by Christ and His Apostles. The Tabernacle of God with men seen by St. John in his vision. In the material Church Christ dwells with his people in the Tabernacle to-day. The Churches are always open and it is edifying to see the crowds that attend, especially during Lent. There were it was said to say also great numbers who kept away and remained in a life of sin and forgetfulness of God. All should do their best and use all the influence they could to bring such people back to their duty and a realization of their duty, for now is the acceptable time, now is the hour of salvation. The above is only a poor synopsis of His Grace's beautiful and touching sermon.
