Hobart, Australia, Dec. 2.-The Australian Antarctic expedition, under the leadership of Dr. Douglas Mawson, sailed for the South in the ship Aurora, commanded by Capt. J. K.

The Aurora is a sailing ship fitted with auxiliary engines. The members of the expedition comprise a number of experienced explorers, including Dr. Wilde, who participated in the Shackleton and Scott expeditions. Lieutenant Ninnis, of the Royal Fusiliers, an expert on surveying and
