### Movements of Prince Albert.

At three o'clock yesterday afternoon H. R. H. Prince Albert came ashore with other cadets from H. M. S. Cumberland. An hour later the party were entertained at the residence of Lady Morris and then visited Government House. Return on board ship was made at seven o'clock.

Last night His Excellency Governor and Mrs. Davidson and Major Davidson were entertained on board the Cumberland by Capt. Smith. Capt. Beech, A.D.C., dined with the officers on board. Prince Albert, who, with his cadet companions, was attending to his regular duties and retired at 9.30.

This afternoon at 3.40 the Prince will land at the King's Wharf and from there he will proceed by coach along Water Street, Queen Street, Queen's Road and Military Road to Government House where a Garden Party will be held. It is hoped that the weather will be favourable for the landing.

### Northern Ships

Report ice and good sign cod in the Straits and along the coast. The Mangle arrived at Humbermouth at 6.10 p.m. yesterday. Her report to the Reid Mfr. Co. was as follows: "Made all ports of call to Battle Harbor. Had strong east gales in the Straits with rain and fog. Fish striking in on Nfld. side, but the lobster fishery is so far a failure."

The Duchess arrived at Lewisport at 7.15 p.m. yesterday. "Made all ports of call going, and returning. There is a good sign of fish all along the coast but too much ice yet to keep traps in the water."

### Bit With a Flat Iron.

At 5.30 p.m. yesterday Consts. Day and Blundon were called to the residence of the Pitcher family on Central Street where a fracas occurred which came near ending in the death of Frederick Pitcher. Hard words had passed between the man and his brother Herbert, when the latter seized a heavy flat iron and striking his brother with great force in the head, inflicted two severe cuts, one on the side of the head and the other on the back. The man bled profusely and Dr. Starford was called and attended to his injuries. Herbert was taken to the police station by the officers.

### A Child's Peril.

A vendor of tea yesterday left his horse and express at the fountain opposite the Western Fire Station while he went to visit some customers. A little boy aged 8 was left in the express holding the reins when suddenly the horse took fright and dashed east over New Gower Street.
