## "How Little We Knew."

It is the firemen who set fire to houses. That is why, immediately after you see firemen rush to a house, you see it burst into flames. I suppose you consider these startling statements. They are to me also. But I am not authorized for them. They come from the lips of my four year old nephew, who knows more about this subject than his father or mother, his grandfather or grandmother, his uncles or his aunts, in short than all the world of grown-ups who try to convince him to the contrary.

The connection between firemen and fires has been carefully explained to him over and over again. But he simply shakes his head and says, "No, no, the firemen set the fires. Naughty firemen. I hope they won't set fire to this house." And in his eyes is the superior look of one who knows, and who has a half contemptuous pity for our ignorance.

Funny little boy! How we laugh at him and his amusing belief in his own superior wisdom! And yet, and yet, well do you remember when you graduated from high school how very wise you were? Could any grown-up with merely forty or fifty years experience in this vale of laughter and tears ever know as much as you know them?

To be sure, you did not think that firemen set the fires instead of putting them out, but were there no other matters about which you were as positive as my little nephew that you know more than your parents or anyone else in the world? Have you not come to laugh at some of the ideas you held then as heartily as my little nephew will laugh about his firemen delusion in a few years?

What an opinionated little person you were then! Now that you have grown so much wiser you can afford to laugh at your implicit belief in your own infallibility. Now, of course, you are really right when you think you are.

And then, to-day in its turn becomes yesterday. And to-morrow becomes to-day. And again we look back and realize the absurdity of our certainties—this time perhaps with more of thoughtfulness than laughter.

And so it ever goes. From one epoch of our lives to another we are always looking back, realizing how little we knew before and congratulating ourselves that now at last we are really wise.

Funny, positive little boy. — we laugh at you, and yet to the infinite wisdom surely our mistakes, our certainties, our half truths must be just as absurd. For even our greatest knowledge, our most perfect wisdom is but a striving to see through a glass darkly. And when the day comes that we shall see clearly, and shall know "even as also we are known," I somehow like to think how we shall look back across the gulf and say yet once more, "How little we really knew."

LONDON, April 3.  
Mr. Asquith was given a big send off when he departed from London to-day for East Fife, where he is to deliver a speech to-morrow to his constituents. In spite of the decision of the Unionists not to oppose his election, big crowds of Liberal supporters gathered at the stations along the line, and at every stopping place he received addresses from the Liberal Associations, expressing the wish that the electors of East Fife send you back to Parliament with redoubled authority to maintain the traditions of the army, the authority of the Crown, and the power of the people.

LONDON, April 3.  
In the Commons, Mr. Balfour insisted on an immediate general election or a referendum, in fact on any device likely to prevent the Commons from dealing with the Ulster problem. It is evident that the Federal solution is meeting with only lukewarm support from the majority of Liberal and Irish members.

TORREON, April 3.  
Strawn with dead and wounded, after a six days' battle Torreon was occupied by the rebels last night. In all the fighting no foreigner was killed or injured. The taking of Torreon marks the climax of the first campaign in the revolution to oust Huerta from Mexico City. Villa es-

timates his own losses at 500 killed and 1,500 wounded with a Federal loss of 1,000 killed, 2,500 wounded and an unknown number of prisoners. There were about 10,000 men in each army. The battle line was four miles long. The field was determined by three great hills, and shape like a carpenter's square, at the end angle of which lay the towns of Coahuila and Torreon. General Gervasio giving the three soldiers any rest after the eleven days battle, Villa to day ordered immediate advance against Saltillo and Monterrey.

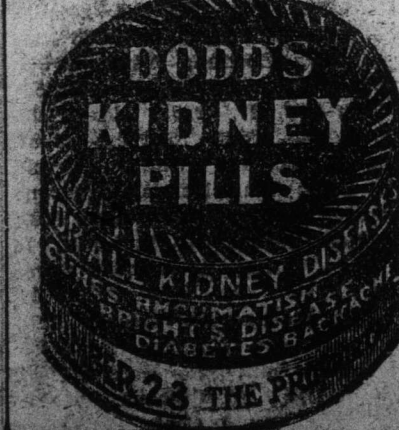
WASHINGTON, April 3.  
The Mexican embassy here to-day still claimed victory for the federal forces in Torreon in an official dispatch from the Secretary of State for foreign affairs giving an account of the defeat of the rebels under Villa. General Maas, who left Saltillo several days ago with reinforcements, has arrived at Torreon. General Demolins has reached San Pedro de Colonias, where a decisive defeat administered to the rebel forces set out to oppose his advance. The government also succeeded in raising a loan of over 5,000,000 pesos which will assist it in its efforts toward pacification.

LONDON, April 3.  
The aromettes set fire to Liberty Castle, County Antrim, last night and left a messmate for Carson, vowing vengeance on him for having made the announcement several days ago, that he was not in favor of the suffragettes. The fire was discovered before any serious damage was done.

LONDON, April 3.  
A sentence of six years' imprisonment was imposed to-day upon Fredrick Gould, who was found guilty of trying to sell British secrets to a foreign power. Mrs. Gould, who was jointly tried with him was discharged.

GLASGOW, April 3.  
Three bombs were exploded by the suffragettes to-day in an attempt to blow up Belmont Church in this city. The explosion, however, only slightly damaged the building.

### Ponderous Personages.

JOHN SMITH.

Author of "At Good Old Siwash."

John Smith is a dazzling illustration of what can be accomplished by energy and determination. Born of distinguished parents and provided with two names so common that whenever any one called him, half of the country side rose up and said, "I'm coming," he set to work to give himself a great name. He did not do this by obtaining a title or by changing the spelling to "Smythe," either. He merely became so famous that when the name "John Smith" is mentioned in history to-day, not one person, however ignorant, stops to inquire "Which John?"

Smith was born in England in 1539 and was distinguished by his great faith in America. He believed that if the state of Virginia, which was at that time a wholly savage state, could be cultivated, it would produce tobacco, corn and presidents in vast numbers. Accordingly, he organized a colony, loaded it into three ships about the size of the Emperor's life boats and landed in Virginia in 1607.

This school books portray John Smith at this period as a stout man in a chilled steel vest and several bushels of beard. He looks like a venerable patriarch and it is a shock to discover that while engaged in defending his infant and worthless colony and in finding food for its yawning young, he was twenty-eight years old. For several years John Smith, untroubled all the brains and most of the labor and fighting for the colony—after which he gave it up as a bad job and went home.

While John Smith was engaged in exploring Virginia he was captured by the Indians and after they had held him a few weeks, they decided to beat him with a large stone as a gentle discouragement to future colonists. At this point, Pocahontas, the daughter of the Chief threw herself upon Smith and declined to consent to the execution. This saved his life. After when Pocahontas was visiting in London on her wedding trip, Smith read of the event in the society columns and hurrying around to the hotel, he had his deliverer presented to court to Queen Elizabeth. Thus Pocahontas was the first American girl to be presented at court. If John Smith lived to-day he would be smothered by the mobs of rich young American girls determined to save him at all hazards.
