OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Aug. 31.
The Governor, Newfoundland, is fitting out a General French reports no fighting to record since August 18th, but two enemy aeroplanes were brought down. A successful aerial attack was made on Houthout forest.

COAL STRIKE SETTLED.

LONDON, Aug. 31.
An official announcement was made to-day that the dispute which threatened another coal strike in the Welsh coal fields has been settled. The agreement provides that the award made by Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Trade, after the previous strike shall stand. The mine owners undertake to conclude a supplemental agreement which will give engineers and other surface workers who were not included in Runciman's award, the same bonus as the miners. The exclusion of the surface workers was the chief source of dissatisfaction. The men have obtained their demands under to-day's agreement. This has been accomplished without the necessity of upsetting the ministerial award so that ostensibly Runciman's decision has not been reversed.

DESTRUCTION BY AIR CRAFT.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 31.
A telegram from Macbode says the Allies aviators destroyed last Saturday large buildings at Ghent, Belgium, used by Germans for housing aircraft.

NO CHANGE IN BLOCKADE POLICY.

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.
A London cable to the Tribune says: "Minutest attention is being paid here to every move in the Arabic situation. In no quarter is there the slightest disposition to agree to any modification of blockade in return for Germany's cessation of submarine campaign. It is felt that Germany's desire to abandon submarine war is due to her inability to carry out previous efforts have proved failures and that she is not building submarines as fast as they are being destroyed."

COPPER FREIGHTER ABANDONED.

SEATTLE, Aug. 31.
Loaded with a cargo of copper valued at \$250,000, the freighter Edith is reported helplessly adrift and abandoned by her crew, fifty miles off Cape Hinchinbrook, Southern Alaska.

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SUBMARINE SUCCESS AT CONSTANTINOPLE.

LONDON, Aug. 31.
An Athens despatch says a submarine of the Allies has blown up a portico of the bridge between Constantinople and suburb of Galatz.

PREPARING FOR WINTER CAMPAIGN.

PARIS, Aug. 31.
France is preparing for next winter's campaign. An official note issued here to-day describes the visit to the front by the Minister of War, who discussed measures necessary for a winter campaign with Commanders at various points, particularly in the Vosges and Alsace.

PASSED WRECKAGE.

KINGSTON, Ja., Aug. 31.
A vessel which arrived at this port, reports passing a mass of wreckage between Cayman Islands and Jamaica. The wreckage is believed to be that of a large steamer but means of identification were lacking.

LONDON, To-Day.

It is reported that Adolph Pogoud, the famous French aviator, is killed.

THE DROP IN STERLING EXCHANGE CREATES GREAT SENSATION - MAMMOTH LOAN THE REMEDY.

NEW YORK, To-Day.
The tremendous export trade from the States for the first time is imperilled to-day by the alarming drop in foreign exchange rates, notably in sterling. At the close of business to-night, the English pound fetched but \$4.55 1/2 American money. This is a drop from its normal value of 31 1/2 cents. From its value August 1st, 20 1/2 cents and from its quotation the day before of 5 1/2 cents. This twenty four hour fall, without precedent, marked the lowest value yet recorded in the excited market where every day recently sets a new record in depreciation. It indicated that Sterling was headed downward with a momentum and velocity which promised to take it lower, unthought of ten days ago. Bankers here wondering how much longer the British would pay the premium and buy the goods from this market, which she can get elsewhere where value of her money is greater. The English pound becomes depressed, and bankers say because London failed to provide a method here of paying the big bills now coming to American shippers. The remedy would be, they thought, to establish quickly, very quickly, unless Sterling should become still further debased a mammoth credit loan in this market. America does not want British gold to pay for supplies. On this point opinion is unanimous. The result in Wall St. and banks are already choking with gold, more gold tends to create a period of enormous inflation. What New York bankers want to do is to lend Britain an enormous sum of money to be spent in paying bills here on approved collateral and high class American railway, industrial stocks and bonds. This it is believed will restore conditions. The deputation of British bankers reaches New York on its mission to straighten out market. They will come with a plan, it was authoritatively stated to-night which their associates in New York is wholly in ignorance.

CONSCRIPTION UNPOPULAR.

LONDON, Aug. 31.
It is daily becoming more evident that the outcry of the radical journals against national service, fails to command the general sympathy among the workers. British socialist groups have formed a National Defence Committee, and intend to hold a patriotic demonstration at Colston Hall during the sittings of the House of Commons in that city early in September. The chair of the patriotic gathering will be taken by J. A. Hodson, President of the Communist Party, and many years a member of the Independent Labor Party, an advanced socialist organization. The arrival of a mission of workers from Canada yesterday caused considerable comment here, people failing to understand why there are unemployed in Canada in view of the munitions now being made in the Dominion. There is a general feeling that there is lack of organization somewhere, and many would not be surprised should Canada shortly import munition workers from Britain.

WINNIPEG, To-Day.

It is expected they will be remanded. The four ex-Ministers voluntarily appeared at the city police station and were released on bail of \$50,000 each.

ROME, To-Day.

However, he is relentless in his endeavors to mitigate the horrors of the conflict and bring about a situation where his efforts on behalf of peace will be likely to have some chances of success.

NO REPORT FROM SUBMARINE PRIVATE.

BERLIN, To-Day.
The German Admiralty to-day advanced the suggestion that the submarine which may have torpedoed the steamer Arabe possibly foundered or had been sunk by the British. A high official of the Admiralty again declares absolutely that no news of the sinking of the Arabe is yet available. The official would not state whether one or more of the submarines in question still were out, nor how long any vessel had been away from its base, but stated suggestively they seldom remain out longer than three weeks. He usually got the report of any torpedoing operations from eight

to fourteen days, rarely later than a fortnight after the occurrence.

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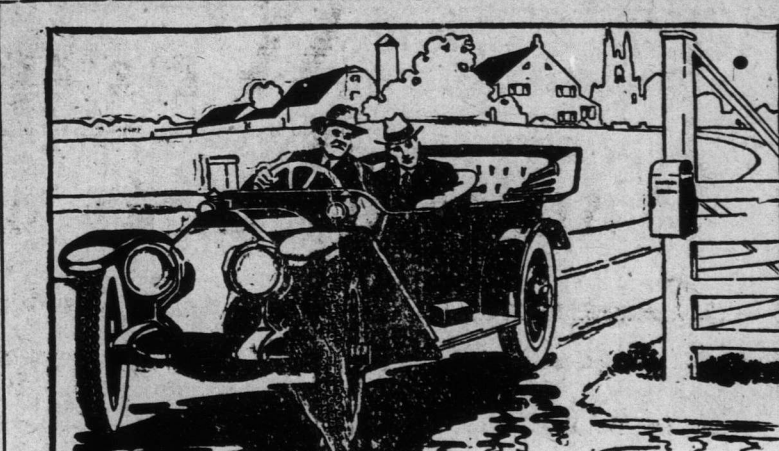
