#### Lenten Regulations.

The following Lenten Regulation

Regulations for Lent.

1. Every day in Lent, except Sunday, is a fast day, on which one meal only and a collation are allowed. A slight refection, however, over and above, may be taken by those who need it, by advice of the Confessor. 2. By an Indult from the Holy See, renewed April 24, 1914 (ad decennium), i.e., until 1924, permission is given to use in cooking the lard or fat of animals on all fast days throughut the year, except Ash Wednesday

and Good Friday. 3. Alos by the same Indult the use of flesh meat is allowed on all Mon-


