

WHAT IT MEANS TO ORGANIZE A PERFORMANCE BEFORE . THE KING.

Although English monarchs have, most of them, visited the theatre from time to time, it is a curious fact that Queen Victoria was the first of modern monarchs to order the theatre to come to the King, or rather the Such a command had not been given

for nearly three hundred years not since the days of Good Queen Bess. Plays are given, by command, either at Windsor or Sandringham. The late King Edward several times "commanded" a company to Sandringham. A command performance means a deal of responsibility for the manager, and much extra work for the company. The stages of the private theatre at Windsor and Sandringham are, of course, much smaller than those of an ordinary London theatre, and special rehearsals are necessary so that the actors may become accustomed to moving in a narrower space.

The play itself has often to be cut, and the dialogue modified. Naturally, too, the scenery has to be adapted for so much smaller space. Special programmes are printed—those for the King and Queen being on white satin.

The company go down by special train. The performance itself is nerve-straining work, for there is not the usual applause. It is not etiquette for the audience to applaud unless the King first sets the example.

Supper is served to the company after the play. The leading people are usually presented to the King, and many well-known actors possess charming little gifts presented to them, by Royalty as souvenirs of these special occasions.

When all is over another special train is in waiting, and thus the return to London is made.


