to prepare for promotion provided by
the Ex-Students' Bureau of the
School should attend at once for a
full term, to advance with these se-
lect classes affording such great ad-
vantages and to be ready when the
Christmas rush commences.

The School has justly won the
name of the Newfoundland Business
College through the efforts of its
Principal, Mr. P. G. Butler, a New-
foundlander and a graduate of New
York University School of Commer-
cial Science.

Sunday School Service.

AT ANGLICAN CATHEDRAL.

The gathering at the Anglican Cath-
edral yesterday afternoon was cal-
culated to encourage and inspire all
present in Missionary enterprises. The
occasion was the third annual service
under the auspices of the Sunday
School children of the diocese who
three years ago undertook the support
of a Missionary in China, and who
have since been represented by Rev.
Ives Stocker, in the diocese of Shan-
Tung. It is fitting that this service
has prominence during the Synod Ses-
sion, the regret being that the gener-
ous children of the outports are per-
force denied attendance. The Sunday
School children of the Cathedral, St.
Thomas's, St. Mary's and St. Michael's
were present in force, and the clergy
in attendance at Synod were also at
the service, as well as a number of lay
representatives and other friends.

The prayers were said by Rev. Can-
on Smart, R.D., and the Lesson read
by Rev. A. E. Legge, chairman and
secretary, respectively of the Synod
Board of Religious Education; the ad-
dress being delivered by the Rector of
the Cathedral, Canon Jeeves in his ad-
dress got very close to the hearts of
his attentive listeners, as he present-
ed a vision of Missionary activity based
upon the principle of unselfishness
and the desire to help others. The
helping of those less favoured than
ourselves is productive of greatest joy,
and this giving of our best, or our-
selves is most acceptable and profit-
able.

The nine deaneries of the diocese
were represented in this offering, and
the amount presented exceeded \$2-
100.00. The presentation was made by
nine little girls, five of whom are re-
sidents at the Orphanage, and were able
to represent their home deaneries of
Trinity, Bonaville, Conception Bay,
Fortune Bay and St. George's, the re-
maining four being from the city Sun-
day Schools. Altogether the service
was delightful and closed with the
Benediction by the Bishop. We are
sure the children precluded by dis-
tance from attendance, will rejoice in
the knowledge that their efforts are
shown and appreciated at these annual
services.

At St. Michael's.

The services at St. Michael's Church
yesterday were of the usually bright
and attractive character. At the Missa
Cantata, 11 o'clock, the Rev. Canon
Field with colourant, with the Rev. J.
T. Hiscock, Rector of Fogo, Deacon,
and Rev. E. M. Bishop, Rector of
Heart's Delight, Sub-Deacon and Rev.
N. G. Vivian, Rector of Pushthrough
seated in the Sanctuary. The sermon
preached by the Rector of Fogo, "On
the Ambassadors Character of the
Priesthood," had special reference
to Queen's Theological College, for
which the aims of the faithful were
being devoted that day.
