Attended to the landing of 85 head Attended to the landing of 85 head of cattle, 40 sheep, 6 horses and a lot of pigs from the "Canadian Sapper," also saw to the landing of 24 head cattle from train. Shot three dogs which were suffering from disease which is very prevalent among dogs just now. Had a horse suffering from sore back and sore shoulder destroyed. Veterinary surgeon examined it and pronounced it unfit for work. Stopped a man from driving an old horse, took charge of the horse and put it in Lescharge of the horse and put it in Lester's stable. Delivered the horse to owner next morning, who said he would not have it working again. Cautioned nine teamsters for fast driving. Sent in four lame horses for treatment. Some express horses yoked at nine o'clock Saturday morning and are in harness until twelve o'clock Saturday night. I believe all this could be remedied if shoppers would make their purchases earlier. I also attended to quite a number of 'phone messages concerning the treatment of dumb animals.-J. BARTER.

Tarvia Prevents Dust: Tarvia Preserves Roads.

In the United States and Canada Tarvia is the standard by which all other road-binders and preservatives are judged.

Tarvia is made in three grades,-"Tarvia X" for road construction, Tarvia B" for preservation of road surface and "Tarvia K-P" for repairing roads. Both "Tarvia B" and "Tarvia K-P" have been used in St. John's Municipal works for several

"Tarvia B" actually enters the road surface, acts as a cement and resists the tear and wear of traffic. By cementing together the dust particles "Tarvia B" prevents the formation of dust.

After the application of "Tarvia B" to a road surface a thin layer of sand should be applied to take care of the excess liquid and to prevent tracking. This layer of sand will prevent Horses from slipping and Automobiles from skidding and will prolong the life of the road surface. Broken stone is not as satisfactory or as economical as sand for this

A road after being treated with "Tarvia B" does not become muddy in rainy weather, but sheds the water and dries off quickly after the rain, leaving the road in admirable condition while untreated roads are still deep with mud.

"Tarvia B" surfacing should be applied annually but only when roads are in good condition and free from surplus dust. All holes and depressions should be repaired with fine broken stone and "Tarvia K-P."

When "Tarvia B" is applied by mechanical sprinkler, care should be taken to have men with brooms and hand sprinklers go over the ground so that excess "Tarvia B" may be brushed out and not allowed to run waste and so that bare spots be treated and the entire road surface

A loose, "happy-go-lucky" application is sheer waste of time and money, "whatever is worth doing, is orth doing well."

"Tarvia B" is admirably adapted r the treatment of sidewalks and walks in parks, hospital grounds and cemeteries. Wooden planking of bridges will last longer if treated with "Tarvia B." The Customs and Confectionery

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—An item appeared in your issue of Tuesday, concerning the importation of Confectionery, or rather the means employed by some parties of passing import entries through the Customs for Confectionery. The fact that half the truth is often no better than a lie is my excuse for asking the use of your columns in publishing this letter. As a matter of fact, in regard to Confectionery imported very lately, there has been no very great variation between the actual weight, and the invoiced weight of these goods, but I think the public should know that such cannot be said in regard to certain lines of Confectionery (now conspicuous by their absence) that were on the market here up to a short while ago. This is commo knowledge among the retail confectionery trade.

It seems strange that someone importing competing lines did not "blow the roast" long ago, as anyone knowing the duty rate on these goods and the selling price here could see quite easily that the Customs were not getting their rights though, like myself, they may never have put thru' a set of entries for Confectionery. It looks as if invoices were coming here certified, with deliberate intention to defraud, and someone was guilty of something worse than smuggling. It is a pity the officials responsible for the correctness of these invoices had not moved earlier and caught the parties red-handed. Evidently someone "on the inside." intentionally or otherwise, gave the game away. That is why there is no material difference at present.

The new regulations for having all confectionery examined will accomplish nothing of importance now, for reasons very obvious, but if put into effect without the knowledge leaking out beforehand, a couple of months ago, there would probably be something doing.

Perhaps, Mr. Editor, some of your readers could tell if it is true whether certain shipments of confectionery arriving here about two weeks ago were sent back again by the same route they came? or whether a certain box of confectionery which was imported as one cent goods, were brought to the examining store by a gentleman not an importer of confectionery, weighed and the duty figured out at more than half the selling price, locally? If these two questions can be answered in the affirmative ,it would almost make a person think that discrimination was being shown.

In thanking you, Mr. Editor, in advance I leave this subject to abler hands than mine to deal with-if they consider the subject warrants it, and I sign myself. Yours truly,
