## Trade Relations With Russia

The British Foreign Office has intimated to the Soviet envoys in London that the Treaty recently made with Russia by the late Government cannot be recommended to Parliament for ratification. While it is evident that the Zinovieff letter, which the Government claims is authentic, may have tended further to increase the feeling of mistrust towards Soviet Russia, it must not be concluded that the Treaty has been discarded entirely on that account.

Recently Mr. Stanley Baldwin declared that the policy of his Government would be to negotiate with Russia for commercial treaties, and even had this decision not been announced, it must have been obvious that the resumption of commercial intercourse at the earliest date was desirable and to a great extent necessary.

Russia before the war was one of Great Britain's best customers, and the loss of her unlimited supplies of raw material has largely been responsible for the unemployment in the manufacturing centres. In addition to that, British capitalists have extensive investments in Russia, and loans to the value of millions of pounds advanced during the war are still outstanding.

In the Anglo Soviet Treaty which was agreed to immediately before the downfall of the Labour Party, the terms were of such a general nature that there was no guarantee that the repudiation of the earlier loan would be reconsidered, that investments would be recoverable, that the proposed loan would be properly secured, or even that it would not be expended in such a manner as to prove a menace to the country advancing it.

It may be taken for granted that in any agreement made by the present Government, the terms will be specifically stated, and that the safeguarding of Britain's interests and the extension of her commerce will weigh far more with them than any of the communistic theories which appeared to exercise such a predominant influence in previous negotiations. Napoleon's term of contempt when he described England as a "Nation of Shopkeepers" is to-day one which few if any country would consider as anything but complimentary.

## A Bargain in Real Estate

A dead bargain in real estate was secured at public auction held at noon to-day in the Board of Trade Rooms when the property of the Newfoundland Packing Co. at Bay Bulls was disposed of for \$5,000. The name of the purchaser was reserved but we learn that it was a private bid received by the solicitors of the company, Messrs. Howley and Jerrett. The property consists of a large wharves and several buildings which were used for drying, freezing and smoking fish and the manufacture of cod-liver oil. It is in fairly good condition and was built in 1913 and 1914 by the Newfoundland Packing Co. at a cost of \$270,000. There was not more than a dozen people at the sale. Messrs. Dowden & Edwards, auctioneers, made every effort to get a higher figure but without avail.

## S. S. Anversois Arrives in Port

### SHORT OF COAL.

S.S. Anversois, bound from Blyth to New York, with a cargo of pulp, entered port yesterday afternoon, short of coal. The ship met with stormy weather while crossing the Atlantic, which greatly impeded her progress and, as a consequence, ran short of the necessary fuel. Hon. Tasker Cook is the ship's agent. The Anversois is a steel screw steamer of 3,393 tons gross and 2,437 net. Her dimensions are, 335 feet long, 42 feet beam and 25 feet deep. She was built in 1901 by Palmer Co. Ltd., Newcastle, and is registered in Antwerp, Belgium.

## PEPYS BEHIND THE SCENES

November 20th.—Lay long, being much troubled by my rheum, nor can I find aught that will give it relief. So up abroad, and do seem as how business is good on Water Street, since I have seldom seen so much traffic on the street for the time of years. But Lord, how difficult it is to conduct a conversation on Water Street, being that the noises made by carts on the stone paving blocks is such as to drown all other sounds, and almost to deafen one. A strange thing this day is the part hearing of a trial on the street, when in the case of the Crown against L. Reid, the judge, court officials, jury and counsel did come out on the steps of the sessions-house for the part examination of a witness. This night to the Club, where I have not been this long time, but suffer so much discomfort from my cold that I compelled to go home and to bed.

## Double Drowning at Brooklyn, B.B.

Yesterday afternoon the management of the Railway received a message from their agent at Brooklyn, Bonavista Bay, stating that a double drowning had occurred there a few hours previous, when two boys named Pyle who were out boating in a nearby pond were the victims. It is presumed the boat capsized, and the unfortunate lads, being unable to swim, sank before assistance arrived. Very little particulars of the drowning have been received. The victims were the sons of Section Foreman Pyle of the Bonavista Branch Railway. The bodies were later recovered.

## Logging Commission

To meet the demands made by Mr. K. Brown and other members of the Opposition, in relation to logging commission, the Government appointed Mr. W. R. Warren, K.C., as a Commission to enquire into the conditions prevailing in the lumber woods. Mr. Warren has been invested with full powers to call witnesses and make examinations under oath. He takes up his duties to-day and leaves by train for Corner Brook, accompanied by Mr. H. G. Garland as Secretary. The Commission will work back along the line taking evidence at the various camps en route.

## Silvia Sails To-Night

S.S. Silvia sails about eight o'clock to-night for Halifax and New York. Passengers are ordered to be on board at 7 o'clock. ## TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

### TO STUDY THE AURORA.

SYRACUSE, N.Y., Nov. 22.

Directly under the Northern Lights where their shifting brilliance fills the air with a sound he likens to the faint rustling of silk or the cracking of tissue paper, Donald B. B. MacMillan, the Arctic explorer, will establish next summer a scientific station where he hopes to discover what the Aurora is and how it can be harnessed to serve civilization, he said to-day at Oswego. The most fascinating phenomenon of the north, Captain MacMillan defies any man to estimate the potential power of the strange illumination centering over Labrador. The first step he said in bringing it under mass control is to measure its distance from the earth. This he proposes to do with the aid of motion picture cameras next summer. Capt. MacMillan said, "I shall set up two cameras a certain distance apart, north and south of the center of radiation. Both will be focused on the same star above the lights and will be snapped at the same time. Knowing the distance of the chosen star from the earth and using it as the apex of the triangle a perpendicular will be dropped to the base and the comparative elevation of the Aurora." The Northern Lights, he explained do not enter above the North Pole as is generally believed but more than 1500 miles south. It is to this magnetic pole and not to the north pole that the needle of the compass is attracted.

RUMOR DENIED. MOSCOW, Nov. 22.

Denial was made here yesterday of reports of mutiny on board vessels of the Russian fleet at Kronstadt. The situation in Kronstadt and Moscow was described as most calm.

RENOUCE THEIR ADOPTED COUNTRY. SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Nov. 22.

Samuel Daniels, 25, and Fred Daniels, 29, British born naturalized citizens of the United States, who fought under the U.S. flag in the World War, have renounced their citizenship because under the new Immigration laws they were not permitted to bring their aged mother from England. Yesterday the brothers planned to apply for passports to return to England, where they will reside with their mother, who is feeble and ill.

KING OF HEJAS REVIEWS FORCES PORT SUDAN, Nov. 22.

The Hajaz Government announces that a review of King Ali's forces was held November 15th at which time it was stated that the army and inhabitants were prepared to defend and relieve Hedjaz from the Wahabites. The incursions of the latter have caused all foreign subjects to seek refuge in Zeddah.

REVOCATION OF EGYPT'S CONSTITUTION SUGGESTED. LONDON, Nov. 22.

The option is widely expressed that notwithstanding the Egyptian officials compliance with customary formalities and their expressions of regret, the murder was actually a political crime originating in a desire to oust the British from the Sudan. The Daily Mail editorially demands Great Britain revoke its grant of independence to Egypt which it maintains has shown lack of political capacity. Other commentators are less drastic but contend that Great Britain will stand for no more outrages, and that the Cairo Government must punish the criminals and pay an indemnity. At the same time these writers hope that the Government will not act hot-headedly or in a panic, a bad impression has been caused here by the news from Cairo that Col. M. T. Russell, Commandant of Cairo police, and A. W. Keown-Boyd, Director General of the Egyptian Department of the Interior have requested Lord Allenby that they be relieved of the responsibility of investigating the assassination, believing such an investigation could be more satisfactorily made through other channels at the disposal of the Egyptian Government.

TURKISH PREMIER RESIGNS. CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 22.

Ismet Pasha the Turkish Premier has resigned because of ill health, his successor will be Fethi Bey.
