GENEVA, Sept. 13. The dispute between Great Britain and Turkey over the Mosul region has been protested to the Council of Nations that Turkish troops have been encircling Christian towns in Mosul and deporting Christians to Turkey.

## TROTSKY AS A PROPHET.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13. Leon Trotsky, the Russian revolutionary, is the subject of a new book, entitled "Trotsky as a Prophet," by the American editor of the "New York Times," which predicts disaster for the United States when the "inevitable hour will come for American capital also."

## HEATHER HETHPOOL, AT HALIFAX.

HALIFAX, N.S., Sept. 13. The Heather Hethpool, recently purchased by the Farquhar Company for service between St. John's, Halifax and Sydney, is now being operated by the Sable Line. The ship, ten days out from New York, is capt. George Murley, and the Sable Line will take over the service between Halifax, St. John's and the West Coast of Newfoundland. The Hethpool has a capacity for 100 first and 70 second class passengers.

## ELECTED BY LARGE MAJORITY.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13. Mayor John R. Hylan, stormy petrel of New York City politics for seven years, was defeated for re-nomination by the primaries, by State Senator James J. Walker, Tammany delegate, by a majority of over 60,000. Only two-thirds votes counted. Newspapers prophesied that Walker's plurality would reach 100,000. Republican primaries proved a disaster for Frank D. Waterman, manufacturer, who led other candidates to 1.

## DENY BRITISH ACCUSATIONS.

GENEVA, Sept. 13. The British accusation before the League of Nations that Turkish troops had captured and carried off Christians in the Mosul area, denied by Turkish representatives tonight. They declared that the Christians in that particular

district mentioned by the British and said the British accusation was a reply to the Turkish offer to negotiate a regional security pact between Turkey, Iraq and Persia.

## PRINCE EN ROUTE TO BUENOS AIRES.

SANTIAGO, Sept. 13. The Prince of Wales, whose return to Argentina has been delayed by snowstorms and landslides in the Andes Mountains, left Vina Del Mar on a special train for Buenos Aires at 1.55 a.m. Large crowds gave him a cordial farewell.

## NOVA SCOTIA BONDS SOLD AT A PREMIUM.

HALIFAX, Sept. 13. The underwriting of the issue of \$4,000,000 two year provincial bonds at 4-1-2 per cent. interest, to-day was awarded to a syndicate made up of Wood Gundy and Co., the Royal Bank of Canada, and the Eastern Securities, Ltd., at 100.85, payable in Halifax. This was the second Nova Scotia bond issue sold at a premium within a year.

## A REMINDER FOR BORAH.

PARIS, Sept. 13. A trench hat belonging to a Verdun veteran, seven wooden legs and one United States decoration, distinguished Service Cross, given a French soldier for saving the life of an American in the Argonne, were left by a delegation of French Veterans of the Great War at the United States Embassy to-day with instructions that they be sent to the United States Senator Borah, so that on the eve of departure of the French debt funding mission to the United States, he be reminded of the million and a half of French war dead and maimed.

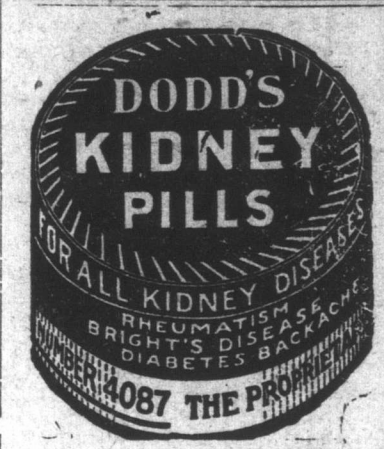

In the sculling race the prizes are a coil of rope and a dozen fishing lines presented by the Colonial Cordage Co. Keen contests are expected as the fishermen from all the nearby settlements will take part.
