THE SEARCH FOR DR LIVINGSTONE.—
We understand that, on July 15th, her Majesty's ship Petre! received on board at the Cape the expedition, under the command of Mr. Young, which has undertaken the search for Dr. Livingstone or his remains, and that the ship was to sail on the evening of the same day for the mouth of the Zambesi. On arriving there the various sections of the steel boat, especially built at Chatham for the use of the expedition, will be put together, and the party will proceed up the river to the Shire, and thence as far as the Murchison Falls, where the boat must be taken to pieces again and carried some thirty or forty miles overland. There will then be a run across the Lake Nyassa, within fifty miles of the northern end of which is the spot where Dr. Livingstone is alleged to have been murdered.—Pall Mall Gazette.
