Wills Sues Dempsey

(By the Associated Negro Press)

Isn't it a sight for the gods: and a sensation for your funny bone: that Harry Wills must even be compelled to go into court to try to make Dempsey stand up for a fight, and may even fail to catch the "dodger" by this lawful method. Two years ago the New York State Boxing Commission said that Dempsey would be compelled, by law, to fight Wills within one year. Then later, it seems, that white folks got their heads together and Dempsey was allowed to dodge on till the present day.

Just think of it! In order to get a fair fight out of the white man, the Negro must appeal to the Supreme Court of the State, but whenever it's one hundred to one, the whites are perfectly willing. When one hundred, or one thousand, whites, can go with guns and chase one empty-handed black, the fight comes off promptly. But where there is to be a referee, a time-bell, a set of rules about fouling, and a one-to-one match, a court and a jury seem to be needed to get the white han to stand up to it. O, of course, it is different when there is a gang, when there is some one near to trip the Negro, to grab his legs and pull him down, or to attack him from the rear while the brave one attacks him in front. That is different, and it is dead easy to get a fight of that kind.

And now, Mr. Dempsey hurries to announce that "just because" Wills appealed to the courts, "I will never fight Wills." It seems to us that Dempsey was in just a bit of a hurry to make that announcement. It came so easy, that we suspect he was just looking for some good pretext to say that, for the last two years or more. What are courts for, anyhow, if they are not to be appealed to for the settlement of points of law? Is it a crime for Wills to ask the State to make Dempsey stand by his pledges and to make the white man's Boxing Commission stand by its own pronouncements?

We are glad Wills is thus showing Dempsey up to the world, and making it known that it will take the state to make Dempsey fight him, even if the state will do it.

"I will never fight Wills,"—that's what we had been suspecting all along, Mr. Dempsey. That is no information to us. And we suspect that Wills has come to the same conclusion, and is therefore resolved to expose you.

Colored Trainmen Meet

Memphis, Tenn., Sept.—Outstanding among achievements of the Association of colored railway trainmen who just ended their annual convention at Bluefield, West Virginia, was the creation of a positive sentiment endorsing support for Negro trainmen in their efforts to maintain a strong stand before the railroad governing bodies of the country to the end that Negroes shall not be shut out from employment in remunerative work on the roads.

The necessity for such an attitude was stressed by J. H. Eiland, grand president of the Association of Colored Railway Trainmen and president of the convention. Eiland was unanimously elected. In a speech accepting the position to which he was re-elected, Eiland stressed the necessity of the trainmen's organization, being the one strong Negro body with power to make itself felt with the United States Railway Labor Board, doing all in its power to make its influence truly effective. To this end it declared it imperative that all the rail workers of the South band themselves together into a responsible body whose voice, when heard, would be authoritative.

The convention agreed that an immediate campaign should be put on to enlist the interest of all the men in the South, Southeast and Southwest. This drive, an intensive one, is to continue up into October. Already
