The action of the Chicago and Grand Trunk Railway Company in directing it agents to charge but 2 cents per mile tr all Michigan points on its line, in accordance with the Chapman law, leads to the belief that the company has attardomed its announced purpose of fighting the matter out in the United States Supreme Court.

The C. P. R. officials at Montreal deny that there is any truth in the statement that the company is about to establish a line of Atlantic freight steamers between St. John, N. B., and Liverpool. The sole object, they say, of Mr. Van Horne's recent visit to St. John was to arrange with the representatives of that city for the terminal facilities for local trade which have been so long talked of.

The Board of Trade of Little Falls has raised \$40,000 for the construction of the Little Falls and Dolgeville. The sum of \$30,000 has been raised in Dolgeville, and the road is now assured, The citizens of Little Falls are considering a proposition to confer with the New York Central officials with a view to having Little Falls made the terminus of the proposed northern railroad, from the New York Central to the St. Lawrence River.

The franchise for the Northern Michigan Road, a proposed line from Houghton, Mich., to Watersmeet, Wis., 70 miles in length, will, it is authoritatively stated, be sold at an early date to the Milwaukee and Northern Road. The negotiations therefor have been in progress for some little time, and are about consummated. The Milwaukee and Northern people propose to build the line next summer.

One of the greatest undertakings of 1891 will be the extension of the Great Northern Bailway from the north central part of Montana to Puget Sound, a distance of 500 miles across the Rookies, through the famous Flathead Lake county, across the Panhandle of Idaho, into the Kootenai country, and through the entire length of the State of Washington to tidewater. When completed it will be the shortest line by 250 miles of any transcontinental route and opens, up a large area of undeveloped mineral, timber and agricultural country. The Great Northern Railway has opened to traffic 162 miles of its new short line extension to the Pacific coast.

Intelligence from Suspension Bridge states that Bridge Engineer L. L. Buck his prepared plans for the building of a stone arch bridge by the side of the present Grand Trunk Bailway suspension bridge, to be used for freight purposes, leaving the present structure for the use of passenger trains only. These plans have been adopted by the company, and the new bridge will be build in the near future. The increases in the freight teaffic of the Grand Trunk and its connecting lines has been so great that for some time it has been apparent that increased facilities must be provided, and Mr. Buck has solved the problem by proposing the stone arch bridge. His estimates for this structure were so low that they were accepted at once. The new bridge will be placed by the side of the present smucture, probably below it, where it can be easily reached from the present approaches. It is said that the new bridge can be built in six months, and it will undoubtedly be begun within the present year.
