A River Rescue.

What might have been a serious accident
happened down the river about 4 p.m.
yesterday. Two gentlemen and two ladies
hired a row boat from Milne's boat-house,
and all went well until they reached the
spot where the Victoria disaster occurred.
One of the cars became entangled in some-
thing, and the young ladies becoming
frightened, the boat was upset, throwing
the four into the water, which is very deep
at this place. None of the party could
swim. One of the young ladies was sink-
ing for the last time when Mr. J. F.
Heintzman, the carman, who was out for
his spin down the river, came to the
rescue. He directed his attention first to
the sinking young lady, and then suc-
ceeded in bringing all ashore safely. Too
much credit cannot be given Mr. Heintz-
man for his brave act in jumping out of his
car, and saving the lives of the four, who,
it is needless to say, were loud in their
gratitude.

Alleged Burglar Caught.

Detective Thomas Nickle yesterday
afternoon added another to his list of
important captures when he took into
custody Wm. Baker, of Chicago, formerly
of this city. Baker is charged with break-
ing into the office of the Wabash Railway
at Springfield, Ill., and robbing the safe of
\$1,177.33 on the night of Sept. 3. The police
in Springfield had suspicion of a certain
gang, and the case was followed up by the
company's detectives. On Sept. 3 George
Baker, a brother of the prisoner, "Happy
Kennedy," alias Paul Hamilton, and
Teddy Frost, a crook of some
notoriety in Chicago, were arrested
at Wm. Baker's house in the outskirts of
Chicago. The officers took the trio to the
lockup, and returned for the prisoner,
William Baker, but he had fled. Since then
Detectives Furlong and Wm. Ballard, of
the Wabash Railway force, and W. W.
Ansley, an operator and detective in the
company's employ, have been searching for
Baker. They traced him to London,
and the party arrived here on Sunday.
Detectives Nickle and Elder rendered them
all the assistance possible. A photograph
of Baker was produced, and on this clue
was the arrest made. Nickle was coming
towards the city on a car about 3 o'clock
in the afternoon and spotted his man go-
ing east. Together with one of the Chi-
cago officers, Nickle took a right about
face, and on reaching the Fair grounds
saw Baker jumping through the fence.
The handcuffs were applied and Baker was
soon on his road to the station in the
wagon, whence he was transferred to the jail
to await extradition proceedings. Baker
is a native of London, and is said to be a
tough character. His father lives on Eva
street, East London. Baker goes by the
alias "Betty," and the genuine Betty
Baker, who is a brother of the prisoner, is
now in Rochester. He was sent down from
London many years ago, and served ten
years in Kingston for burglary.

Baker will fight extradition. He was
arraigned before Judge William Elliot this
morning and remanded for a week to allow

of the necessary formalities. Counsel for
the prisoner, Mr. Ed Meredith, tried to get
bail, but the judge would not grant it.
Baker's wife stood in the doorway with her
baby in arms and listened to the case, and
when the prisoner was led forth to the cells
he pointed to Detective Ballard.

"If that man insults me or bothers you with questions," he
said to his wife, "shoot him."

Detective Ballard visited the wife at
Baker's parents' place this morning. She
said that they had simply come to see the
Fair. She did not explain how she and
her husband managed to give the Chi-
cago police the slip.
