DOUBLE DROWNING.

A Man Loses His Life in Trying to Prevent Suicide.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 12 .- A sad drowning accident occurred at Revelstoke, B. C., last night, E. S. Wilson, a miner, evidently bent on suicide, jumped into the Columbia River. A large number of per-sons gathered on the banks of the river and attempted to aid in his rescue, but he refused all offers of assistance.

Andrew Whalen, one of the spectators, seeing that Wilson was caught in the strong current and was fast being carried down the stream, plunged into the river, but before he could reach Wilson the latter had disappeared.

Whalen then tried to return to shore, but the strong current had also got him in its grasp, and before assistance could be rendered he too disappeared. Wilson had been in a demented state lately. He had previously tried to do away with himself by hanging.

IN CONGRESS.

The Income Tax Sustained by a Big Vote.

Washington, Dec. 12.—By a vote of 127 to 54, taken by tellers, the House today refused to strike out of the Urgent Deficiency Bill the item of \$24,509 to enforce the collection of income tax provided for in the tariff law passed last session. Mr. McMillan (Tennessee), the author of the provision, defended the appropriation and the law, and used Wm. Waldorf Astor's name as an illustration of the expediency

Austrians Want Suffrage Reform. VIENNA, Dec. 13 .- At ten Socialist meet ings held here today the speakers declared that if the suffrage laws should not be reformed next year the workingmen would take matters in their own hands and force a quick solution of the problem.

Decline in Steamship Shares, LIVERPOOL, Dec. 12.-The shareholdere of the Dominion steamship line met here today and accepted the Richards Company's offer to purchase the concern with liabil ities for £4 163 6d a share. The shares were issuedoriginally at £20 each.

Sir Arthur Sullivan's Success. LONDON, Dec. 12.-Sullivan and Burnand's comic opera "The Chieftain" was produced at the Savoy this evening. It was received enthusiastically, and many numbers were encored. The scenery was magnificent. Sir Arthur Sullivan conducted the orchestra, and after the last curtain he responded to the tremendous calls, by appearing arm in arm with the librettist, Mr. Burnand.

The War-Barbarous Acts of the Japs. London, Dec. 12.—A dispatch from Tien Tsin says that 25,000 Japanese troops have arrived at Nan Hai Kwhan. The Chinese soldiers at Wei Hai Wei declare they will leave that place immediately upon the approach of the Japanese.

A dispatch from Hiroshimi says a detachment of the Japanese second army occupied Foo Chow on Dec. 5 without meeting any opposition. The Chinese garrison, 5,000 strong, retreated to New

Chwang.
The New York World's special correquarterly dividend of li per spondent (Creelman) telegraphs from Yokoentered Port Arthur Nov. 21, and massacred practically the entire population in cold blood. The defenseless and unfortunate inhabitants were butchered in their houses and their bodies were inhumanly mutilated. There was an unrestrained reign of murder, which continued for three days. The whole town was plundered, with appalling atrocities. It was the first stain upon the Japanese arms. The Japanese in this instance relapsed into barbarism. All pretenses that circumstances justified the atrocities are false. The civilized world

will be horrified by the details. The Japanese minister at Washington expresses the strongest disbelief in the reports of the atrocities alleged to have been committed by the Japanese troops at Port


