On the Great Lakes During the Past Fiscal Year.

Finest Steamboat on Chattahoochie River Reported Sunk and All On Board.

Washington, Sept. 18 .- The annual report of the supervising inspectorgeneral of steam vessels for the fiscal year ending June 30, shows that 163 vessels were inspected at Detroit, a gain of three over the previous year; 203 at Port Huron, gain of 17; 106 at Marquette, gain of four, and 203 at Grand Haven, two less than the preceding year. The loss of life on vessels on the great lakes aggregated 31 persons, 5 in collisions, 4 by vessels sinking, 15 by accidental drowning, and 7 from miscellaneous causes.
