The Situation.

BOERS LEAVING NATAL. London, Feb. 21-4 a.m.-The Boers are leaving all the positions held by them on British territory, and are concentrating for the defense of their own. Sir Redvers Buller's force are about to raise the siege of Ladysmith, and this is the large news of the day. Gen. Clements reports that the force confronting him has been greatly diminished. Ten thousand men are estimated to have gone from the Colesburg district alone. The Boers are also retracing their steps from Zululand. Thus they are relaxing their hold on all sides in order to assemble to oppose Lord Roberts. He is press- started for Looperbey. ing on steadily towards Bloemfontein. This is shown by his inconsequential telegram from Paardeberg, 50 or 60 miles away. Doubtless he is miles behind the column that is pursuing the

Boers, and the next important news may be the occupation of Bloemfon-

WHERE IS CRONJE? Nothing has been heard from the chase of Cronje for two days. Although the last words of the war office last (Tuesday) night were that there was no news for publication, there is a strong disposition to believe that favorable information has been received, but is being withheld until the operations culminate in something more conclusive. There is an equally strong disposition to think that Gen. Cronje has got away. Owing to the lack of transport, the British are not likely to invade Boer territory except where Lord Roberts is operating. Gen. Buller will have to stop at the Drakensberg Mountains. Probably a part of his 40,000 men will ultimately join the legions of Lord Roberts. If, as Gen. Buller avers, the Boers are retreating from him, then the news on every side is favorable to the British. Nevertheless, troops continue to go up. The war office thinks that the call to veterans to rejoin the colors, together with the bounty, will bring 45,000 men to the home defense. The urgency with which home defense is pressed

the British losses now aggregate 11,102 PERTINENT SUGGESTION. London, Wednesday, Feb. 21. — Mr. Spencer Wilkinson, reviewing the military situation in the Morning Post today, says: "The meaning of the posi-tion in Natal is that the Boers have sent the bulk of their forces to resist Lord Roberts. Gen. Buller's aim is to join Sir George White and then either push on to Laing's Nek or to send back two divisions to reinforce Lord Roberts, retaining two in Natal to complete the recovery of the northern triangle. It is to be hoped that Lord Roberts will overcome Gen. Cronje before the latter is reinforced. Otherwise, the British commander may find himself facing a Boer army equal in strength to his own, as all the Boers appear to be hurrying toward Cronje. The British commander ought soon to

LORD ROBERTS AT PAARDEBERG London, Feb. 20, 2:56 p. m.—The war office has issued a dispatch from Lord Roberts, the main importance of which is the fact that it is dated Paardeberg, 7:05 p. in., Monday. Paardeberf is 30 miles east of Jacobsdal. The dispatch announces that the railroad to Kimberley is open, and that Gen. Methuen will proceed there with rein-forcements forthwith, and that large

supplies will be forwarded to the town THE CAPTURED CONVOY. Craddock, Cape Colony, Feb. 20 .- Details have arrived here with respect to the capture of the British convoy at Riet River. It appears that the wagons were laagered near the drift, and that the convoy was attacked by 1,800 Boers, with four guns. The shelling continued all day: 180 wagons were captured, containing provisions and forage. Half of the drivers and leaders were killed or are missing.

CANADIAN OFFICER WITH GEN. FRENCH. Toronto, Ont., Feb. 20.-Capt. Forrester, a Canadian officer, was with Gen. French, and took part in the relief of Kimberley. Mrs. Forrester today re-ceived a cable message from her husband, Capt. Forrester, of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, who accompanied the first contingent to South Africa as one of the special service officers. The message, the first to reach this city from the lately beleaguered town, only contained one word, "Safe," but is eminently reassuring to his friends. who were not previously aware that he had been attached to the relieving column. Capt. Forrester is now sup-1 posed to be taking part in the attack

on Gen. Cronie's forces. AT MAFEKING London, Feb. 21 .- A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Mafeking, dated Friday, Feb. 9, says: All business here is being conducted underground. The resident commissioner has sumptuous apartments in a subterranean bombproof. The Cape Police have a large hall, with a plano. The Mafeking Hotel dining room seats 40. All these

have been dug out, and are impervious TRIED TO CAPTURE A 12-POUNDER Buluwayo, Monday, Feb. 12.—Col. Plumer sent Major Bird with 200 colpials to attempt the capture of the Boer 12-pounder on a kopje near Crocodile Pools. Major Bird met with such a terrifle rifle and shell fire that he considered the position too strong and ordered a retirement. Hon. F. W.
