Port Stanley Barbor.

To the Editor of the ADVERTISER: In 1858 an arrangement was made between the Government and the L. and P. S. Railway Company whereby the company was to collect the toils and expend the same in improving and enlarging the Port Stanley harbor. The harbor at that time was quite small, could not receive large vesseis, and was quite insufficient for the business. The result of the arrangement was that the toils increased from \$3,000 a year at that time to \$14,000 per year, when the G. W. R. leased the road in 1872 and the L. and P. S. R. had expended \$96,000 on the harbor and made it so that it could receive the largest class of vessels on the lakes. In 1858 an arrangement was made b

pended \$99,000 on the nattor amade it so that it could receive the largest class of vessels on the lakes.

When-the road was leased this business all stopped, the G. W. R. having no business in that direction, and the harbor was last going to wreck, not one dollar having been spent upon it since the L. and P. S. R. was leased by the G. W. R. Company. In 1890, when alderman of the city, my attention was called to the fact. I brought it to the notice of the council and recommended that something be done at once. A deputation was appointed to call upon the Government in relation to the matter, consisting of his worship the mayor and my selfforthecity and Mr. Pricefor Port Stanley. The result of our visit was a promise to Mr. Langevin, Minister of Public Works, that the city would send down its engineer to examine the extent of repairs necessary and the probable cost.
