THE MARKETS

THE LOCAL MARKET. London, Wednesday, July 23.

Ten loads of berries formed the bulk of the offerings at the market here this forenoon. Prices are a trifle easier. Black raspberries sold at 5c to 5½c per box in crates, and 6c per single box. Red raspberries sell at 7c to 8c per box. Several loads of new hay sold at \$9 to \$10 per ton. The demand is good.

About twenty dressed hogs were purchased at \$9 per cwt.

WEEKLY REVIEW. The wet weather of the past week has affected the attendance, and the offerings on the market here. The bulk of the offerings has been berries, vegetables and the smaller lines of farm produce. Grain—All told there were not over a dozen loads of wheat offered during the week; prices are quoted at \$1.38 per cwt. There has been an increase in the price of oats; sales were made during the past few days at \$1.47 to \$1.50 per cwt; this is an advance of from 7c to 10c per cwt on the prices paid the previous week; very little oats are now held by the farmers.

Butter in crocks sells at 15c per lb, and pound rolls at 16c to 17c. Butter brings 13%c to 14c for crates and basket lets.

At the Dinner of the Constitutional Three Hundred Persons Arrested Club in Old London-A Galaxy

of Free Nations.

London, July 23 .- The Times gives the following account of the dinner at the Constitutional Club, at which Sir Wilfrid Laurier was the chief speaker.
A complimentary dinner was given last night by the Constitutional Club to imperial guests from the colonies. The Duke of Marlborough presided, and among those present were Lord Waldegrave, Sir W. Laurier, Sir W. MacGregor, the Hon. A. Peters, the Hon. G. W. Ross, the Hon. W. Mulock, Sir John Forrest, Mr. John Honger St. Walter Peace, the Hon. Howard, Sir Walter Peace, the Hon. H. Copeland, the Hon. W. P. Reeves,

and many others. LOYAL COLONIST'S. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who was received with loud cheers, after acknowledging the welcome accorded to the guests, said: The guests who are here assembled at this board have come from all over the globe; and in coming here their object was first and last to testify to the loyalty of his majesty's possessions beyond the sea to the person of his Majesty the King and to British institutions. Five years ago it was the privilege of many of those assembled at this board from beyond the sea to visit England in order to take their share

in the celebration of the jubilee year of a sovereign whose life was the pride of her subjects and the honor of mankind. (Cheers.) On both occasions the opportunity was seized to discuss problems and questions which affect the welfare, not only of the colonies, but of the mother-land as well. (Cheers.)
