MUSIC AND DRAMA

Effie Ellsler in "When Knight Hood Was in Flower."

"When Knighthood was in Flower," presented at the Grand Opera House last night to a fair-sized audience, is probably the one exception to the rule that a book-play cannot be as satisfactory to the spectator as the original story is. Mr. Paul Keister has taken Charles Major's sloppy-styled, crudely-written, disjected and woefully padded story, and out of it has made a compact and interesting play. Its very divergencies from the book are an improvement, and the result as a whole is an enjoyable production so far as the work of the dramatist is concerned.

To those who had not the opportunity of seeing Miss Julia Marlowe's magnificent appointed presentation of the play and charming rendition of the leading role, last night's performance was a satisfactory one. The task of Miss Effie Ellsler was a hard one, following as she did an actress of the consummate art and personal winsomeness of Miss Marlowe. It is all the more creditable to Miss Ellsler that she made her characterization of the fiery, impulsive and wilful Princess Mary such a pleasing and enjoyable piece of acting. Equally good was the work of Mr. Walter R. Seymour as Charles Brandon, the commoner, who, though living centuries too soon to have read the modern poet's rendering of the advice of the old Persian Hafiz,

"Seek not for favor of woman,
So shall he find it, indeed,"

had nevertheless so acquired the spirit of it that he won the love of the king's sister through following it. The efforts of the principals were discounted, however, by the monotonous mediocrity of the support accorded them. The stage management also was not above criticism.

CITY COUNCIL REVERSES DECISIONS OF COMMITTEE

Rejects Recommendations Made in Report of No. 1.

Ald. Cooper Makes Grand Stand Play for Popular Notice.

The city council held a meeting last night, which was not the least interesting of those that have been held this year. The attention was not burdened with the work they had before them, but even this they took very seriously. Practically the only important business they had came by way of No. 1 committee's report, in which were the recommendations referring to tenders for advertising and printing. These were not adopted, and in the course of their rejection Ald. Cooper and Ald. Winnett were rivals in themselves performing the most important act, which, even in Ald. Cooper and Ald. Winnett, caused some astonishment.

COOPER SURPRISES ASSOCIATES

Votes for Effect for the Motion Which He Had Strongly Opposed.

Clause 7 of the report recommended that the tenders of The Advertiser and Free Press for the city advertising be accepted.

It would move the adoption of this, but instead, Ald. Greenlee moved that the tenders of the News and the Echo be accepted, the tenders having been read and the same shown to be as follows: The Advertiser, 10 cents per line; the News, 5 cents, and the Echo, 4 cents. Ald. Greenlee seconded the motion, and he and Ald. Greenlee supported it on the grounds of economy. Ald. Cooper moved in amendment, and was seconded by Ald. Douglas, and the contract he awarded to the Free Press and the News at their figures. Ald. Stevely said that if it was simply a matter of having it, the contract was as much right as the one given to the Free Press; whereupon Ald. Cooper fell to eulogizing the paper which he says he takes, and Ald. Greenlee, by his views upon the subject of the excellences of the papers of this city were so manifestly and so positively distorted that it was almost impossible to follow him. The aldermen listened with woe on their countenances till the man with the Right Idea came along in the person of Ald. Greenlee, who dispersed the gloom that overshadowed the brows of the thinking men on the board, by uttering the words, "The Advertiser is by all odds the best and brightest paper west of Toronto. That matter having been satisfactorily settled, the aldermen proceeded to put up their minds about the contract.

It was here that Ald. Cooper drew attention towards himself. He was the strongest advocate of the Free Press-News combination, the more expensive one compared with the News-Echo duo. As such, he was teased by Ald. Greenlee, who, in a horrible picture of Ald. Cooper floundering in the mire of electoral repudiation next January after the people had awakened to the awful reality that Cooper—the economist—Cooper had not, on this occasion, embraced the cheapest existing combination. He threatened to record his vote in the year and a half ago, and he voted for it. It was taken, first on the amendment to give the contract to the Free Press and the News, and then on the amendment, of course, he voted for it. It was lost. The vote upon the motion to give it to the News and the Echo, however, was carried by a majority of one, and Ald. Cooper's amendment was superseded. Ald. Greenlee in calling for the years and nays upon it, and actually voted for the motion that he had argued against as foolishly as he could. This was so that it might go on record that he had voted for the cheapest way of doing the advertising. The aldermen all but gave into roars of laughter when he made his coup. That he voted for effect was shown when he subsequently gave notice of motion to reconsider the awarding of these contracts.

WINNETT'S SUDDEN CHANGE

Makes Quick Vote and Cooper is Reprimanded.

Ald. Winnett's turn came next. Clause 8 of the report recommended that the contract of A. Talbot & Co. for the city printing be accepted, it being the lowest bid.

PARK COMMISSION BYLAW

Was Given Its First Reading—A Merry Trip for Chief Ree.

Ald. Campbell's bylaw to amend the by-laws so as to provide for the appointment of a park commission was given its first reading, and referred to the city solicitor.

Ald. Campbell provided against an undue expenditure by restricting it to an appropriation to be made by the council.

A convention of the chiefs of the fire departments of the United States and Canada will shortly be held in New York city, and No. 3 committee suggested that Chief Ree be allowed to attend it. The council agreed, and voted \$30 to defray his expenses. A return ticket to New York costs \$22, so the chief will have \$8 left with which to have a time.

Ald. Douglas stood out strongly against preventing bicycle riding on the east side of Park avenue next to the park. He said that the place was practically unused by pedestrians. His remarks brought upon him the censure of Ald. Cooper, who upbraided him for what he said. The council also was rather angry that Ald. Douglas had spoken, as his speech caused Ald. Cooper's.

The proposal was sustained, however, notwithstanding that Ald. Cooper spoke in favor of it.

Under the usual conditions, Mr. Lillie was allowed the use of the city hall on Thanksgiving Day and the three succeeding days. The request was strongly opposed by Ald. Cooper. He spoke for about half an hour with this application as a text, but the other aldermen felt that the city was not so good that it should refuse the brethren a chance to do some work. The drift of Ald. Cooper's remarks was that the city hall should not be used in competition with the churches. The council smiled.

A C. P. R. engineer asked the council to recommend to his company that he be allowed to live in Toronto instead of in this city, where he now lives in accordance with the agreement between the C. P. R. and the corporation. Ald. Campbell thought that it was purely a case of the interior economy of the road, and did not concern the city. He moved that the communication be filed, which was done.

The council referred to No. 2 committee the petition of John Higgins for the removal of a fence on the east side of Clarence street at the M. C. R. station, which, it appears, inconveniences the mail carriers.

Mr. Alex. Harvey asked for an extension of time in which to build on the Talbot street property conveyed to him by the council. The council were disposed to treat Mr. Harvey fairly, and referred the matter to No. 2 committee with power to consult the city solicitor.

W. H. Bartman's notice of application for an indictment on account of an alleged nuisance at Cavendish street was referred to No. 2 committee, with instructions to consult the city solicitor.

A number of ratepayers petitioned against the removal of the electric light from the corner of Regent and Waterloo streets. The petition was referred to No. 3 committee with power.

Mr. R. Ironside was retained as inspector on the construction of tar macadam pavement, at the usual wage of inspectors.
