

UNITED STATES CONGRESS PLACES COAL ON FREE LIST

Measure Opposed by Very Few Protectionists.

PROPOSAL TO SEIZE THE MINES

Factories Forced to Shut Down for Lack of Fuel—Cars of Coal Seized.

Washington, Jan. 15.—The bill reported from the ways and means committee yesterday to provide for a rebate of the duties on foreign coal for a period of one year was passed in short order by the house yesterday by practically an unanimous vote—253 to 5—those voting against it being Messrs. Cushman and Jones, of Washington; Gaines, of West Virginia; Mondell, of Wyoming; and Patterson, of Pennsylvania, all Republicans.

The bill was considered under the operation of a rule which cut off opportunity to amend.

The only opposition to the measure came from some of the members, representing coal states, who expressed the fear that the admission of coal from the mines to the market in preference to the coal industry in their states.

Both Mr. Dalzell, of Pennsylvania, and Mr. Payne, of New York, the Republican leaders, expressed the opinion on the floor that the bill would not relieve the existing distress. They said it would satisfy public demand for action and show the disposition of Congress to do what it could.

DID NOT GO FAR ENOUGH.

The Democrats, although they all supported the bill, took the view that it did not go far enough, saying that coal should go on the free list and when the bill came back they virtually placed anthracite coal on the free list, they applauded vigorously.

Mr. Dalzell, in the course of his remarks, said that there was practically no anthracite coal in the world except that in the United States and a little in China.

When a message from the Senate announced the passage of the coal rebate bill, with an amendment, Mr. Payne (New York) moved to concur in the amendment. The amendment was adopted without division, thus passing the bill.

When the house met today the interest in the coal rebates was increased by an increased attendance in the galleries.

INDORSED BY SENATE.

The Senate acted promptly on the house bill providing for rebates of the duty on coal and passed it unanimously, without debate, a few minutes after it was brought over.

Mr. Aldrich offered a committee amendment, adding a new section to the bill, providing that the provision of paragraph 15 of the Dingley act shall not be construed hereafter to authorize the imposition of any duty on anthracite coal. He asked immediately consideration and this was granted.

TO SEIZE THE MINES.

The chairman of the judiciary committee of the house introduced the following resolution:

"Resolved, that the committee on the judiciary be and is hereby directed to investigate and report to this house with all convenient speed, the opinion of that committee as to the power of Congress to declare that a necessity has arisen for taking possession of all coal, coal beds and coal mines in the United States, and all lines of transportation, agencies, instruments and vehicles of commerce necessary for the transportation of coal, and that if, in the opinion of that committee, the

Crooked Treasurers.

Toronto, Jan. 15.—Mr. Laing, the municipal auditor for the Province, has in hand his annual report. It will show that the care of municipal funds is in the vast majority of cases in honest hands. There are some 800 municipal treasurers in Ontario, and school treasurers in addition, which swell the number of those in charge of public funds to upwards of 1,000. BATHING IN ICE WATER

Sport Indulged In by a Number of Bostonians.

Convalescents Take Daily Open Air Dip Through Ice on the Bay.

Boston, Mass., Jan. 15.—Open air salt water bathing, with the thermometer at zero, sport engaged in by about 40 Bostonians—police, lawyers and business men—who patronize the L street bath in South Boston.

Living into the cold water through a hole cut in the ice, running on the snow and playing handball usually makes up the program of the day, who do not know what cold is, although some of them recently had their feet frozen while taking exercise.

One day recently, when the mercury dropped below zero, six bathers appeared for their customary dip. Every day throughout the cold weather some of these devotees ride over to South Boston for morning bath, followed by half an hour's exercise at handball before dressing.

Many of these L street bathers who follow the sport of outdoor bathing year round, and who bathe frequently for their health and complete physical exhaustion to the sport.

One of the present crowd, an employee at the Hotel Victoria, was speaking of the necessity for a year ago by his physician that there was little or no chance of his recovery from tuberculosis.

The physician suggested as a final extreme measure the open air plunge. Since a year ago last fall this man has been taking systematic open air baths, by means of which he has completely recovered. Many of these bathers who brave the winter weather can vouch for similar stories of poor health regarding themselves.

Washington, Jan. 15.—The treasury department has information which leads to the conclusion that to a limited extent at least, alien girls and women are being procured to the United States for immoral purposes. With a view of ascertaining the exact facts the department has decided to appoint a number of women inspectors for employment at the port of New York, whose duty it will be to board all incoming steamers and make investigation into suspicious cases in the first and second cabins, and to give needed information and advice to those who may be ignorant of the character of the house in which they have been promised employment.

CANADA'S GREAT POSSIBILITIES

Will in a Few Years Be Able to Furnish All the Grain That Britain Needs.

London, Jan. 15.—There were over five hundred attentive listeners to A. W. Hickman's lecture on the Canadian Northwest at the Colonial Institute Tuesday night. Mr. Hickman, who is a Dominion Government agent, was well received, and his statements were highly impressive.

Lord Strathcona, who presided, complimented the speaker, and in the course of his remarks said that a friend of his in Canada had published what purported to be a story of his (the chairman's) life, and in it were personal statements which he utterly disclaimed, and conversations which never took place, and which never could have taken place. He dwelt on the resources and rapid development of the Canadian Northwest, and said that at the present rate of growth Canada in ten years would be able to produce all the grain required by Great Britain, and with an effort on the part of the Dominion Government, there would be no question of the mother country, in case of war, being without food for six weeks for her six years.

Sir Alfred Jones, of the Elder Dempster Company, and chairman of the Liverpool Chamber of Commerce, referred to some length to the greatness of Canada's resources.

Ebenezer Thom, of Queensland, a former Canadian journalist, said he did not agree with the lecturer in his statement that Canada was under obligations to the Hudson's Bay Company, and referred to the colossal ignorance prevalent in England regarding other parts of the British Empire.

W. T. R. Preston, Canadian emigration commissioner, in a vigorous speech dwelt upon the necessity for England to assist in populating her own colonies. Incubators for C'sows.

Susquehanna, Pa., Jan. 15.—Farmer Billings, of Brookdale, has taken a contract to furnish a Chicago miller with 100,000 eggs, at 12 cents apiece. Billings has set up a chicken incubator, in which are placed, as fast as laid, the eggs of about 100 hen crows that have been trapped, with perhaps a dozen cock crows.

Within fifteen days the little creatures are hatched, and a fortnight later they are ready to be hatched. At the rate of four for \$1, dead, they will pay the producer. Farmer Billings has the only cock hatchery in the world, and he is justly proud of it.

Three of the Party Drowned—House Wrecked by Explosion and Two Lives Lost.

Washington, Jan. 15.—While a large crowd was skating on the bathing basin near the Washington monument last evening, the ice suddenly gave way and precipitated twenty or more persons in the water. Three persons are known to have lost their lives, and it is possible other deaths may have been caused by the breaking of the ice. Miss Jessie C. Thomas, a young woman 20 years of age, employed as a clerk in the bureau of ethnology, died at the Emergency Hospital. Two dead men were identified as Arthur Wassbach, an employee of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, and Henry C. Hamill, a clerk in the war department. Wassbach was a native of Washington; Hamill is from Michigan. Miss Thomas, previous to a year ago, had lived in Frederick, Md.

Stirling, Ont., Jan. 15.—About 5:30 last evening a fatal accident occurred on the farm owned by Elvie Hoyle, at the corner of the farm. TWO SUICIDES.

Bay City, Mich., Jan. 14.—Daniel Jaig went into a shed adjoining his house yesterday, shot himself twice in the temple, and then went into the house and died in the presence of his wife and children. Jaig had been ill all several months ago, injuring his head, and has been mentally unbalanced since that time. He was 48 years of age, and is survived by his widow and three children.

Fraser, a widely-known Canadian traveler for eastern houses, was found dead in his room in a local hotel yesterday. His throat and wrists were cut open. A note to the coroner stated that he had killed himself for private reasons. The note further stated that he had traveled on the road for years, in every State in the Union, Canada, Japan, China and South America.
