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BRITISH CABINET

Rumors of Breach Between Chamberlain and the Chancellor Denied—More Peace Rumors.

London, April 12.—In consequence of the prominence given by the afternoon newspapers to the report that a cabinet crisis had occurred, owing to a breach between Mr. Chamberlain and Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, on the method of raising war funds, Mr. Chamberlain today issued a signed statement saying that the report was pure invention and absolutely untrue. Notwithstanding the sensational and diverse rumors evoked by the unexpected summoning of the Cabinet, public interest, as displayed in Downing street, was of an exceedingly languid type. All the ministers were present, with the exception of the lord-lieutenant of Ireland, Earl Cadogan, from which it was inferred that the question of the immediate adoption of a more stringent policy towards the United Irish League did not occupy the foremost place at today's council.

Among the many peace rumors this morning the most interesting is to the effect that the Boers have intimated that "they are willing to come into the British empire, as junior partners, to give up their flag and become part of an African Confederation, with a flag of its own, with a supreme court, and with, practically, an American constitution."

Deaths of a Day.

New York, April 12.—Silas C. Croft, surveyor of the port of New York, died today at his home in this city from heart failure. Mr. Croft was prominent in political circles here for many years, and was appointed surveyor of the port in 1897 by President McKinley.

Washington, April 12.—Rev. Christopher Starr Lettingwell, for twenty years rector of the Episcopal Church at Bar Harbor, Me., died here last night, aged 74 years.

Beaumont, Texas, April 12.—Perry A. Hall, the Chicago capitalist and politician, died this morning from pneumonia.

Chicago, April 12.—Wm. M. Dodd, for 21 years city passenger agent for the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad, in Chicago, died at St. Augustine Hospital early this morning, aged 39 years.

Asbury Park, N. J., April 12.—Henry M. Bennett, president of the Consolidated Gas Company of Pittsburgh, who was interested in a score of theaters in New York, Boston, Pittsburgh and other places, died this morning on his stock farm, near Farmingdale. His death was due to dropsy.

Niles, Mich., April 11.—Mrs. Julia Abrams, the first woman in the United States to learn telegraphy, died here today, aged 85 years. She learned to telegraph at Massillon, Ohio, in 1849.

She entered the employ of the Michigan Central Railroad Company here in 1857 as an operator, retiring in 1865.

CANADIAN TROOPER DIED OF FEVER.

Toronto, April 12.—The governor-general has received a cable from the casualty department at Cape Town, stating that Trooper James Arthur Patterson, of the S. A. C., who was reported ill from fever a few days ago, has died. Patterson belonged to Toronto.

Held up freight train.

Hamilton, Ont., April 12.—Three tramps held up a T. H. and B. freight train, bound from Welland to Hamilton, Thursday evening, and threatened to shoot Conductor McNair when he ordered them to get off. The Hamilton police were notified to be on the lookout, but the hoboes jumped in the train in the outskirts of the city. The police gave chase, but failed to capture any of the men.

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HIS HOUSE PACKED

FULL OF PLUNDER

Starting Discovery of an Alleged Merchant's Peculations—Wagon-loads of Stolen Property Found in His Residence

New York, April 12.—In a residence of a man known as George T. Howard, at Ridgewood, N. Y., the police have made a startling discovery. For two years Howard, his wife and a 10-year-old son have lived at Ridgewood, where the man was highly respected. He was known as a tea and coffee merchant, doing business in New York. Soon after his coming thefts began to occur in all the country surrounding. Horses and carriages were missed, freight depots were looted, farm houses and barns were burglarized promiscuously.

Finally two horses and carriages were stolen from Muncy, N. Y. One of the horses wore a peculiarly shaped shoe by which it was traced for twenty miles, the trail ending in Howard's barn, where the property was found. Search warrants were at once issued, and the house was entered and found to be filled with all sorts of plunder. Only Mrs. Howard was at home. Mr. Howard had disappeared as mysteriously as he did to Jersey City where he was found and arrested, but in the meantime he had communicated with his father, and took his arrest with the greatest degree of composure, even smiling contemptuously at the police, when they tried to make him tell where his father had gone. Then the exploration of the house began. On the back porch was a nearly new road wagon. In the hallway was a new double sleigh. How it was put inside the door the police cannot explain. The house has fourteen rooms, and each room was strewn with goods. Three wagon loads of property were taken to the village lock-up in Ridgewood and, as the available space in the lock-up was filled, officers were put in charge of the remainder of the stuff.

CAME TOO LATE!

Murderer's Reprieve Arrived 35 Minutes After He Was Hanged.

St. Louis, Mo., April 12.—Henry Fletcher (colored) was hanged yesterday for the murder of Louis Roth, Aug. 27, 1900. At 11 o'clock Thursday night Circuit Attorney Folk telegraphed Gov. Dockery, recommending a ten days' reprieve in order to investigate more fully some testimony to the effect that Fletcher acted in self-defense when he killed Roth. A messenger from Jefferson City said that the governor, when aroused by the messenger, refused to open the door to receive the message, but ordered it slipped under.

No answer was received by Circuit Attorney Folk before the hanging, but at 6:45 a.m., just 35 minutes after the fatal drop fell, a telegram was received by the sheriff from Gov. Dockery, granting a reprieve of fifteen days.
