That dauntless navigator, Capt. Bernier, who is planning to reach the Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the leader of the Opposition which ought to be again. Capt. Bernier intends to follow Nansen's plan of taking the current of ice which flows from the Siberian side across the polar regions to the other hemisphere. He would enter the Behring Straits in July with a specially built vessel of 300 tons, and following the coast of Siberia, would enter the ice between 170 and 165 degrees east, which he calculates would drift him further north than Nansen's line. When he reached the point nearest the pole he would leave the ship and employ dogs to carry him. Photographic and scientific records of the expedition would be taken regularly. Capt. Bernier in outlining his plans before the Royal Colonial Institute in London last year, said:

"We would make two different routes, one in the northeast direction and the other in a southwest direction, with stations at different places, so with the ship with wireless telegraphy. and gun-signals when weather permits. The route will be staffed; the staffs with condensed provisions, each one bearing a number and a record, so that the passage of each party will be recorded. At the 50-miles station, soundings and weather records will be taken at intervals, and other observations will be made. When in the neighborhood of the pole the northeast route will be extended to one or more stations, as we may require, always keepand the stations. The number of settlers on the land returned by the local crown lands agents, however, by no means indicates the total extent of the influx, as many have gone in as squatters in townships not at present opened up in addition to the laborers who have gone to Sault Ste. The greater proportion of the new arrivals are from older Ontario, but there is also a considerable movement from Quebec into Southern Nipissing.


